FAR AHEAD OF LAST YEAR

The total value of the cargoes taken away by the 111 winter port steamers this season amounts to \$28,245,992. This is an increase of \$4,578,650 over last year. Last season there were only 111 sailings altogether, while this year there will be about 118. This will bring the value of this season's cargoes up to about \$30,000,000 which will be a material increase over those of any other year.

Halifax, N. S., May 3.—(Special)—Funeral services were held this morning in Brunswick street Methodist church for Protestants, and in St. Mary's Cathedral for the Catholics of the Titanic, whose bodies were recovered. In Brunswick street church Principal McKinnon of the Presbyterian College, delivered an address, and in St. Mary's Rev. Dr. Foley was the speaker.

In Brunswick street church the lieutenant-governor, the officers of the Niobe and those in command of the garrison, with a delegation of Masons were present.

The coffins were carried to Fairview and Mount Olivet cemeteries in hearse, and when all had been placed in graves, brief religious services were held.
