Ottawa, July 30-Capt. Lindsay, acting wreck commissioner, will go to Queber at the instigation of the department of marine and fisheries, to conduct an enquiry into the cause of the recent collision

duiry into the cause of the recent collision between the Empress of Britain and the collier Helvetia. The regular hearing will be proceeded with immediately, and the preliminary dispensed with. In all probability the government may be compelled to construct a drydock in the st. Lawrence, the necessity for which has been emphasized by the collision.

Recently when construction companies were asked for proposals for the construction of such a dry dock, only one answer was received, and that in the form of a tender to build the dock for the government, and to receive an annual subsidy on an amount up to five and a half million dollars. There appeared to be difficulty in financing and this interfered with the bids.

The woman can breathe and she can, though with some difficulty, swallow liquids. X-Ray photos have been made and operations will be postponed until after a tudy of the prints from those negatives.
