MAIN STREET BAPTIST CHURCH ANNUAL MEETING

The annual meeting of the congregation of Main Street Baptist church took place last night. The pastor, Rev. David Hutchinson, D. D., presided and there was a large attendance. The pastor in his report said that the year 1910 was the busiest one that the church had experienced for some time. Eleven members of the congregation had died during the year - D. Harris, Mrs. Maud Mason, Mrs. A. Woodworth, Mrs. L. C. S. Beaumont, J. McNeil, A. Walters, Mrs. N. W. White, D. McLean, Mrs. J. Stevens and Mrs. W. A. Moore.

P. E. Flewelling, church clerk, reported that the membership for the year ending 1910 was 631, of which 505 were resident and 126 non-resident. During the year 20 were admitted by baptism, 29 by letter and one by experience, a total of 77. The number of losses during the year was 27, 17 by letter and 10 by death, making a total membership now of 702.

W. H. White, church treasurer, reported that the total receipts for current and denominational purposes amounted to \$5,853.22 and the expenses \$4,997.75, leaving a balance on hand of \$855.47. Chairman R. C. Elkin and Treasurer P. McIntyre, trustees, reported that the church property was in good order. The receipts for new pews during the year, including balance on hand last year, amounted to \$883.29. The expenses amounted to \$709.86, leaving a balance on hand of \$173.43. They

C. of E. S. S. Teachers

The annual meeting of the Church of England Sunday School Teachers' Association took place in the Trinity church hall last evening. There was a large attendance. Reports were submitted from all the schools, from which it appeared that the number of scholars in attendance were: Boys, 273; girls, 1,078; total, 2,055. Number of teachers in attendance, male, 25; female, 127; officers, 22. The total amount contributed by schools for various purposes was \$2,057.

The reports showed that there had been an increase in membership with the attendance well up to the average. The Sunday school association itself had

to \$42,70, leaving a balance on hand of \$3,91.

Mrs. S. Miller presented the report of the Mission Band, showing the receipts for the year to be \$79 and the expenses \$2, leaving a balance of \$77, which was paid over to the church. A. S. Sprague presented the report of the benevolent committee and A. McIntyre the report of the finance committee. The latter report showed that the attendance during the year had been good and that the duplicate address system, which had been introduced for the first time, worked well. The estimates for the year amounted to \$3,004.

Mrs. W. H. White read the report of the cradle roll department, which showed a membership of 83. W. G. Estabrooke reported for the ladies. H. H. Towne read the report of the deacons, W. H. White the music committee's report and W. J. McClary that of the Sunday school. The election of officers resulted as follows: P. E. Flewelling, church clerk; W. H. White, treasurer; W. H. White, financial secretary; E. E. Flewelling, voluntary treasurer; E. M. Sprague and J. R. Cowan were elected deacons for a term of three years; W. J. McClary, Dr. W. F. Roberts and W. A. Erb were elected to the finance committee and G. W. Mullin to the music committee. A hearty vote of thanks was extended to Messrs. Williamson and Wilson for repairing the heating apparatus of the church without charge. The question of lighting the church was referred to W. F. Mullin, W. G. Estabrooke and W. A. Erb. L. H. Thorne presented the report of the deacons, which showed that the total number of communicants for the year was 1,894 and that the average attendance was 162. It was reported that the Sunday school accommodation was too limited and it was decided to start a fund for the purpose of erecting a building in the rear of the church, where the old church was situated.
