IMPRESSIONS

OF PARROBORO
A Pleasant Visit And Some Notes by the Way; Written for The Times

The visitor to Parroboro who is fortunate enough to find the last-mentioned out as it was found by a Times' man last week, is certain to come away with favorable impressions and pleasant memories.

There was the morning, for example, when Capt. Cook, so well known in St. John as captain for years of the tug Springhill, and now superintending the coal company at Parroboro, led the visitor up to the reservoir and across a hill affording a glorious view of the town and valley, the almost encircling hills, and the wharves and the channel leading out to the Basin. Schooners bring here and there at the wharves or beside the channel were mute evidences of a glory that was Parroboro's in the days of wooden vessels.

Then there was a visit with the captain to some barge, on one of which some pumping was necessary. For personal reasons the reporter declines to say how long he could keep the vessel afloat if left to man the pump. The captain has a pretty home and garden, with one apple tree so laden with blossoms that a picture of it would be a good advertisement of Parroboro.

The Times' man also had a pleasant ride with Rev. Mr. Milbury, lately of St. John, but now pastor of the pretty Baptist church in Parroboro, a pretty master's residence beside it. There was a county convention in this church, and Mr. Milbury was very busy. Among the speakers at the convention was Rev. P. J. Stackhouse, formerly of St. John, but now of Amherst.

Partridge Island Visited
There was an afternoon visit to Partridge Island, a couple of miles from town. Two of us went in a carriage along a pleasant road to the beautiful summer residence of J. R. Cowan, unrivalled for seclusion of place and splendor of outlook. We rode thence along a curving beach to the island (which is not really surrounded by water), hatched the horse to a post, and, after a winding road along the towering slope, Partridge Island is densely wooded, a small green space on the top of a lofty cliff of sheer descent, whence the foot fell off on a steep and yielding carpet of moss and spruce needles, while on either side were depths where the trees rarely pierced through the trees to the green beneath them. Instead of retracing our steps by this rounded way we took a path that seemed to offer a short cut to the place of starting. The path soon left itself in the woods, but we persevered and finally found the place we sought, and were soon in the carriage again, crossing the beach to the shore, the highway, carrying with us mental pictures of beauteous cliffs, the mossy waters, the dense wooded island, and the lone of the colonial and the picturesque in nature as do not fade away.

The Beautiful Beach
Then there was a walk of a mile from the town to the beach, and the beach, almost hidden among low spruces, with wide reaches of sand in front of it, and a lovely bay to the bay. Behind the cottage lay what the doctor calls his "wilderness," a few, but not many, trees, just as Nature made it, except that here and there a tree had been planted to add to the beauty of it all. Later, as darkness fell and a chill air crept in from the bay, we went in again, to lamp-light and the music of the gramophone, and my companion played, and as he played the fire glowed at one end of the living room, while through the overhanging branches of a spruce tree, could be seen the wide world, rising still presently the waves would break against the timber laid along the edge of the beach within a few feet of the door.

At last good night, and the walk through the cool darkness under a starry sky back to the town, with golden memories to recall when the dust of the streets lies one's eyes again, and the work-day world has claimed its own.

Experiment in Forestry

There were other visits to Beach Cottage, and the discovery that in his "Wilderness" Dr. MacKenzie is doing that of which the people of Nova Scotia generally, as well as those of New Brunswick, might profitably take note. He has rows of young white pine trees, and very healthy, that he has grown from the seedlings. 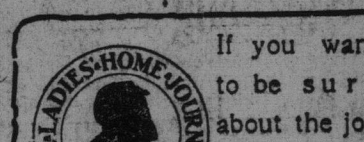
