ORDERS NEW TRIAL IN LAMPERT CASE

Court Dismisses Appeals in Quinton and Other Cases.

(Special to Times-Star.) Fredericton, June 13.—The appeal division, Supreme Court, met this morning. Mr. Justice Grimmer presiding, to deliver judgments.

In the King vs. J. I. Boudreau, appeal was dismissed. The defendant was a vendor in Restigouche County who filed a prescription under the Intoxicating Liquor Act, without labelling his bottles. He appealed his conviction in a lower court to Mr. Justice Crockett, who set aside the conviction. The Crown appealed from that judgment and the Appeal Division supported the judgment.

In Maritime United Farmers Co-operative, Ltd., et al vs. Dickie, defendant's appeal was dismissed with costs. The case was from King's County.

In Hamilton vs. Lamport et al, a new trial was granted with costs. Chief Justice Hazen and Mr. Justice White granted judgment and Mr. Justice Grimmer concurring. The case was from St. John County Court, plaintiff appealing.

In New Brunswick Electric Power Commission vs. Quinton, the appeal was dismissed with costs and cross-appeal dismissed without costs.

Purity Ice Cream Case.

In case Purity Ice Cream Co., Ltd., vs. J. D. O'Connell, appeal is dismissed with costs.

In Babin vs. Babin, appeal was dismissed with costs. This was an appeal from the divorce court. The plaintiff was the appellant.

In Lucas and Co. Incorporated vs. Moncton Supply Co., Ltd., it was ordered that a verdict for the plaintiff be set aside and a verdict entered for the defendant for \$8,112.50 on claim with costs, and verdict for the defendant on counter-claim for \$1,712.50 with costs less amount to be deducted from the greater, also with costs to the plaintiff on appeal.
