There is a lot of sudden heads around here last summer that you could not talk Socialism to when they were working and their stomachs were full. In the past Cotton's Weekly put out personal appeals. We thought we had to do it. These went under first class letters to our readers.

The last appeal we put out was in the beginning of September, 1913. We used to put out one every five weeks. Since that date we have put out none.

During September, October, November and December, 1912, our receipts from subscriptions were \$330.75, \$478.88, \$498.30, and \$614.90 respectively, a total of \$2322.83. During the corresponding months of 1913 our receipts were \$383.22, \$514.62, \$635.50, and \$666.02 respectively, a total of \$2199.36. The four months of 1913 brought us in \$182.47 less than in 1912. This small loss may be due to the panic which has struck us.

It depends upon the next month or two to see whether our appeals had effect or whether the comrades will bust out as well as about urging.

We believe the comrades need no urging to rather all the subscriptions they can for their organ of emancipation, and we know the comrades will not disappoint us.
