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

ALSO ARBITRATION.

London, Jan. 14.—Arrangements for the arbitration of the Alsop claim between the United States and Chile are almost completed, according to an official announcement to-day. Arbitration as planned by King Edward in past disputes is almost certain to be followed in the present case. The plan involves the appointment of a commission of two or three experts, usually headed by an eminent lawyer, both sides and then submit a report and recommendations. The commissioners are merely the advisers and King Edward, as arbitrator, is at liberty to reject their view should he see fit. It is expected that Chief Justice of England, Lord Alverstone, will head the Alsop commission.
