ARRIVALS AT HALIFAX. HALIFAX, June 29.—The Hamburg American liner S. Armenia arrived here today from Hamburg with a big passenger list, mainly Hungarians and Austrians. A few Russians and a number of Roumanians are included in the crowd. The immigrants are chiefly laborers destined for Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta. They go forward tomorrow. About 310 go to Sydney. The 435 required by the immigration department to be in the possession of each immigrant has an effect on immigration.

A telegram received by Hugh Doherty, of St. James street, yesterday, brought news of the death of his cousin, James Earley, which took place at Los Animas, Colo., on Sunday. Mr. Earley was a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Bernard Earley, of this city, and a brother of May Agnes Fleming, a noted St. John authoress. He left St. John years ago and for a long time was connected with the United States Navy. He last visited St. John about six years ago. Mr. Earley had been in poor health, from tuberculosis, for some time and had been in the government hospital in Los Animas, where he died. He was in his 53rd year. Daniel J. Doherty, of Doherty & McHugh, St. John, is a cousin. Interment will be made at Los Animas.

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Tomorrow is Dominion Day, Canada's day of days, and thousands hereabouts will busy themselves to enjoy a holiday. Fine weather is of course ardently desired. The weather man has been rather kind so far this year. It is to be hoped he will be no tomorrow. The attractions, as usual, are numerous and varied.

The members of the Royal Kennebec Yacht Club will have a gala day. A race which is open to all yachts and salmon boats will start at 10.20 o'clock in the morning. The course will be from Millidgeville to Carter's Point and return. The buoy at Carter's Point will be left on the port hand. The salmon boats will finish at Westfield. No time limit for finishing will be given. The prizes for the successful boat will be articles of equipment. R. Thomson and Horace King will be the judges and G. B. Hegan and J. R. Armstrong will take the time.

In the way of excursions and picnics reduced rates are offered on the different railroad and steamboat lines. The Portland Methodist Y. M. C. will run an excursion to Fredrickton and stops will be made at Brown's Flats and Gagetown each way. The Victoria will leave Indictment at 5.15 p.m. sharp.

For the lovers of baseball plenty of that favorite sport will be furnished. In the Tenets League on the Shamrock grounds the St. Josephs and St. John the Baptist performers will play. The afternoon exhibition will be between Captain Devere's boys and the Fairville "inter-beaters". This game should be interesting as the teams are close for the premier position. Good games will also be pulled off on the Every Day Club grounds on the Marsh and the Clippers and Marathons will play in the morning and the Marathons and Exmouths in the afternoon. The Clippers and Marathons will conduct a Scotch picnic at Waters' Landing.

The picnic of the St. Martins church, of which Rev. Father Polter is pastor, will also be an event of the day. A large number of city persons contemplate making the trip. Both Rockwood and Seaside parks will have large crowds. At the former resort there will be a band concert in the evening. The City Cornet Band will give a concert in both afternoon and evening. A fine assortment of fireworks have been secured from the E. W. Hand Co. and they will display during the evening. St. Scammell will provide refreshments and soft drinks of all kinds. The proprietors of private parties will hold picnics at the park.

The "Telegraphers' outing at the Ferns" will be held at the programme of dances will be carried out. The life clubs will shoot in different matches on their ranges. Fishing parties will be in evidence in large numbers. The proprietors of duckboards and life rafts expect to do a rushing business. 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The Common Council met yesterday afternoon to receive the report of the harbor facilities committee. The report accompanied by a copy of the proposed harbor bill was submitted and several sections were adopted. The council then resolved itself into a general committee to consider the rest of the bill, several clauses were considered, but the greater part of the bill was accepted as it stood and recommended to the council.

The most important amendments were those proposed by Ald. Baxter, one providing that the bill should be altered so as to allow the commission to take over any portions of the harbor other than the West side when desired; the other giving the commission power to erect the Navy Island bridge.

The council adjourned until this afternoon at three o'clock, when the report of the general committee will be received. Ald. Willet moved that the report be received and considered section by section.—Carried.

The preamble and several sections were adopted without discussion. Ald. Pickett wished to know why the clause relating to the purchase of the wharves should be limited to the West Side, and suggested that the section be amended to include such other harbor properties belonging to the City of St. John as the corporation may from time to time desire to acquire.

It was claimed by some aldermen that another section provided for this; others held that the bill should be made to state this more clearly. Ald. Rowan wanted the council put on record as favoring the putting of the whole harbor under commission. Alderman Baxter moved as a second subsection of section six the following clause: "The said corporation may also from time to time, by agreement or appropriation acquire any other properties within the limits of the city of St. John as they may be deemed suitable subject to the approval of the government in council."—Carried.

Ald. Baxter moved as a third subsection of the following clause: "The said corporation shall also have power to construct and maintain a bridge across the harbor of St. John at or near Navy Island. After considerable discussion, in which Ald. Kelley accused Ald. Scullin of attempting to advertise himself at the expense of the bill, the section was carried.

On motion of Ald. Frink the council went into general committee to discuss the rest of the bill. The balance of the bill went through without any important changes. On Ald. Baxter's motion a rider was added to the effect that no section of the bill or by-laws shall apply beyond the limit of the property owned or controlled by the harbor corporation.
