ATTRACTIVE EXHIBIT OF FINE ART GLASS

An exhibit that for attractive display and artistic design is being particularly noticed by visitors, is that of the Maritime Art Glass Works, at the end of the west wing of the main building. It was the centre of an admiring crowd yesterday, and it's hardly exaggerating to say that to see this splendid exhibit is alone well worth a visit to the fair. What makes the exhibit of all the more importance to local persons is the fact that everything there, with the exception of the plain glass, is made in St. John by St. John workers in the glass works' large modern factory on City Road. A feature that at once commands attention is the dome over the entrance in American opalescent glass. The lower parts of the walls are paneled in mirrors, and the upper sections show some handsome samples of copper-mounted bevelled and nutre cut plates for vestibules. The walls are artistically set with some exquisite samples of stained glass work. This includes decorative panels for stair windows. Some costly specimens in the style of the "Art Nouveau" are also shown. The work of design, the work of Mr. Bauer, has been artistically planned so as to blend many pretty details into one harmonious whole, and it is well deserving of the large attention which it is receiving.

One of the most attractive exhibits is that of Christie Bros., Ltd., of Amherst, N. S., manufacturers of trunks, bags and suit cases. On exhibition there are among other articles a travellers sample case for confectionery, with aluminum trays, this being a special order for a western firm. A full line of ladies and gents suit cases with ebony fittings, etc., cut glass bottles and wardrobe trunks which arrive with the clothing ready for wear, are shown. The Vulcanized fibre binding used by this firm is most substantial. Messrs Macaulay Bros. have purchased the entire exhibit.

THE WINDSOR FOUNDRY AND MACHINE CO.

Among the exhibits near the main entrance is that of the Windsor Foundry and Machine Co., which shows a splendid assortment of stoves of all kinds. Here can be found the New Silver Moon self-feeder in all of its sizes, made from the original patterns. Mr. R. F. Whipple, who is in charge will explain to the visitor that the original pattern of the New Silver Moon possesses many advantages over the stoves made from other patterns which have departed from the original. The lid of the stove is lifted when the top is moved and beneath and around the chamber that catches the gas from the burning coal has been retained in the product of the Windsor Foundry and Machine Co. It is not possible for the gas to escape but it must depart by the means intended for it by the pipe and chimney.

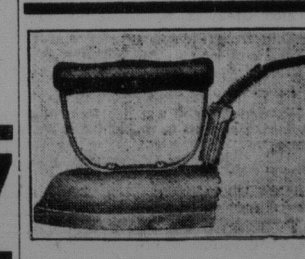
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
