NEW TEXT BOOKS IN BOTANY AND MUSIC

Committee Decide on Two Courses—Defer Action on Chemistry—Those Present at Conference.

Fredrieton, Dec. 29.—The text book committee of the Educational Institute met this morning at the education offices and will recommend two new text books to the Board of Education for use in the schools of the province.

Those present at the meeting were chief Superintendent of Education Carter, Chancellor Jones of the University, Dr. H. V. Bridges, Principal of the Normal School, who are members ex-officio; Inspector F. B. Meagher, who represents the inspectors this year, and Miss Annie M. Hea, H. H. Hagerman, of the Normal School staff, George J. Oulton, Moncton, and Dr. H. S. Bridges, St. John, the elected members of the committee. Dr. Carson, of the University; Dr. Hamilton, of the Normal School, and Prof. Harrison, who is in charge of musical instruction in the Fredericton schools, were also present.

It was decided not to recommend the adoption of any text book in chemistry for another year so that the matter can have further consideration. The text book on botany by Prof. L. H. Bailey, of Cornell University, will be recommended. Dr. Hamilton to prepare a key and flora in connection therewith, and Whiting's book of musical instruction now in use in the Fredericton schools will be recommended for adoption and a committee was appointed to suggest some British and Canadian patriotic numbers to be included in the book.

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CLOSING COTTON LETTER.

By Direct Private Wires to J. C. Mackintosh & Co.

New York, Dec. 29.—After an initial recovery of about 2 to 3 points, predicted largely upon the strong Liverpool cables, today's cotton market gradually sagged off to 3 or 4 points below last night's closing and finally with about half of these losses regained. It may be easily inferred, therefore that the dealings were of moderate volume and unattended by excitement or even activity of any degree. There was more substantial support at the lower range and while the recent sharp reaction and the continued relatively heavy movement had a marked sentimental effect upon scattered holders, the leading bull interests profess to believe that the shakeout has been very beneficial to their position. Spot interest at the South are predicting a perpendicular falling off in ginning figures and the general movement after turn of the year and should this prove true in a ratio which would lend color to low crop ideas, the market would be in all the better position to respond after the recent decline.

CLOSING STOCK LETTER.

New York, Dec. 29.—A strong market attracts more interest as a rule than a weak one, and for this reason it could be said that today's stock market was more interesting than its immediate predecessors because the trend of prices was upward. Nevertheless little or no significance could be attached to the day's business, made up as it was, largely of scalping operations among room traders. The fact remains that if there was little if any important demand for stocks there was an equally notable absence of pressure and from this the professionals took courage to bid up prices. It was hard to find satisfactory explanation in the way of news for the various movements, but there were some items to stimulate interest. The U. P. reporting for the month of November showed a gross increase of more than \$200,000 and while net returns were about the same amount to the reverse side, comparison was made with a good month last year. The Rubber stocks were strong on the announcement that the Inter-Continental Rubber Co., a subsidiary of the U. S. Rubber Co., had acquired important rubber plantations upon the Malay peninsula. Con. Gas showed continued strength accompanied by a diversity of rumors, some of which were more or less shopworn, the most noteworthy of which was a story that the N. Y. C. would not rebuild the power plant recently destroyed and would buy its power from the Gas Company. The market as a whole was dull but strong, showing however no strong disposition to do much either way. The government's briefs in the Standard Oil and Tobacco cases were filed in the Supreme Court today.
