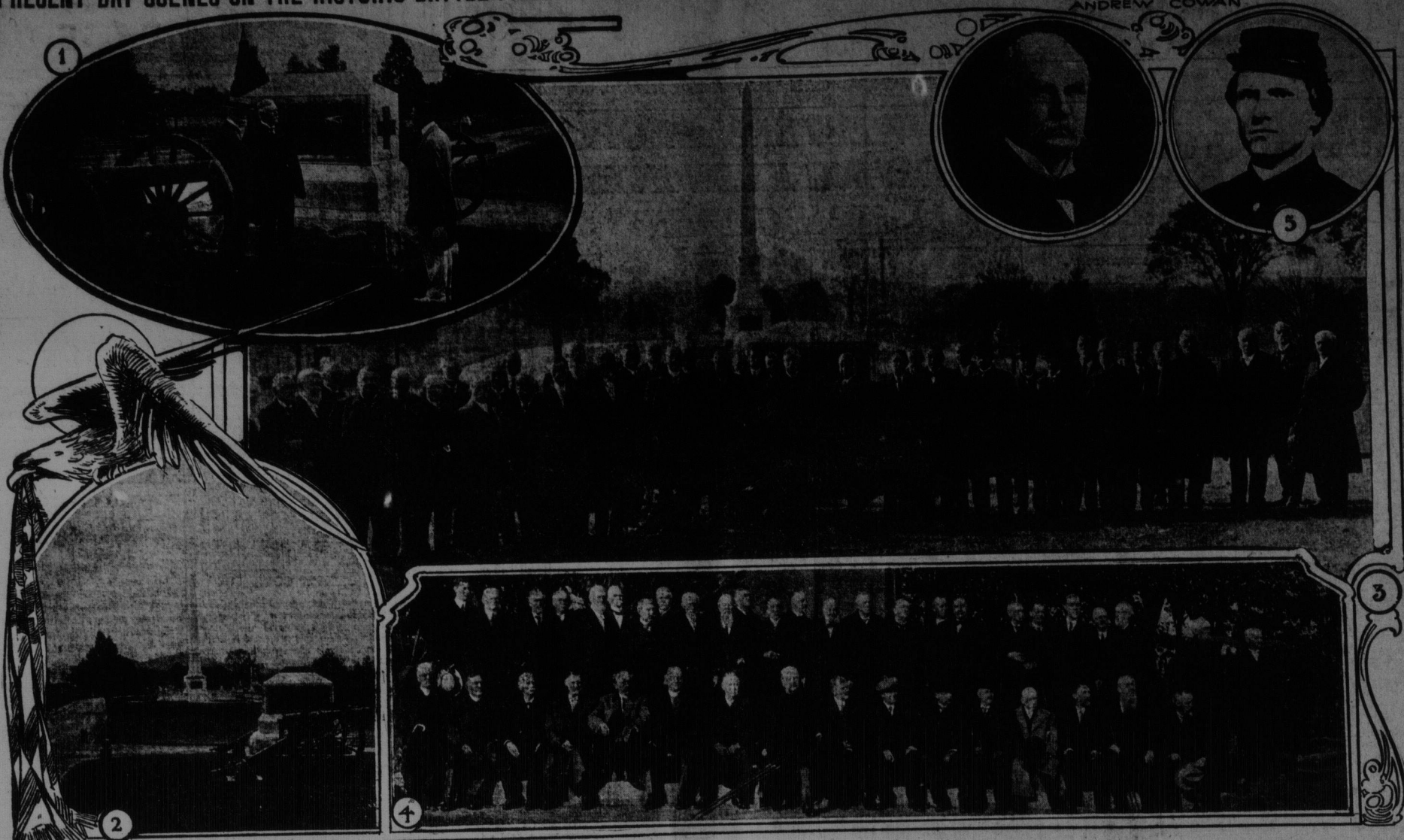


PRESENT DAY SCENES ON THE HISTORIC BATTLE FIELD AT GETTYSBURG AND COLONEL ANDREW COWAN, WHO LED TROOPS TO VICTORY.



DOUBLE cannon at ten yards. These words are graven on the monument to the First New York battery of the Sixth corps, which stands on the battlefield of Gettysburg on the spot where, on July 3, 1863, the battery met Pickett's division of Longstreet's corps at the crest of its magnificent charge, the "high tide of the Confederacy," the crisis of the civil war. At the famous clump of trees was regulated the dower of Lee's army, which the Confederate leader had hurled at the federal centre and which rolled back shattered after prodigies of valor. The First New York battery, which had such a great part at Gettysburg, was commanded by Colonel Andrew Cowan, today's honored citizen of Louisville, Ky. In this group of scenes on the Gettysburg battle field No. 1 shows the memorial to the First New York Battery erected by the State on the spot where the battery met Pickett's great charge. Colonel Cowan, who commanded the battery, is pointing out the direction from which Pickett's division advanced. At his right Professor John A. Himes, of Pennsylvania College. In front is Mr. William Marshall Bullitt, of Louisville, Ky., son of a Confederate soldier, and at the left is the monument erected by Congress in honor of all the regular regiments taking part in the three days' battle. The shaft surmounted by a bronze figure of Liberty is the Pennsylvania State Monument. Photograph No. 2, taken on the battlefield in October last, is of the commission appointed by Congress and State Governors to arrange for the fiftieth anniversary of the battle. General Sickles is seated in the centre of the group and General Horatio C. King, of East Orange, N. J., next to him being Colonel Cowan. Among others in the group are United States Senators Heyburn and Oliver, Governor Wilson, of Kentucky, and General Grant, who commanded the Union army. Photograph No. 3, stands at the right of General Sickles, next to him being Colonel Cowan. In No. 4 is seen the "High Water Mark" Monument, surmounted by an open book of bronze, on which the names of all the federal organizations that took part in the repulse of Longstreet's assault are inscribed on one of the pages and the names of all the Confederate organizations on the opposite page. The background is the famous copse of trees. The old time "ambrotype" of Colonel Cowan was taken in Washington in January, 1865, after the return of the batteries of the Sixth Corps from the Shenandoah Valley campaign.

Resolved, that being conscious of a newer inspiration with higher ideals for more efficient work as laborers with God in the development of the religious life of the church's children, being moved with the conviction that Canon Powell has been the main channel of this inspiration, and deeply appreciating his straightforward manner, the clearness, definiteness, the aptness and untiring continuance with which he has presented his conception of ideals and principles, we, the members of the Summer School and Conference of Sunday School Teachers of 1911 gathered at the Rothersey Collegiate School in the Diocese of Fredericton, do here, with one heart and one mind, offer Canon Powell our hearty and affectionate thanks, and do also assure him of our confidence in him as one called of God to lead in the education and training of our young men for posts of usefulness and good influence in our land whether as clergy or laity. The lecture was well attended and was followed with interest. Following the lecture eight members chosen by the conference, gave their impressions of the conference. 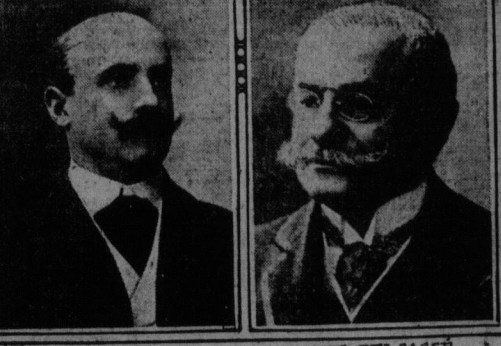

WHY NOT RAISE MORE YOUNG BEEF CATTLE.

Interview with Local Butcher Indicates Possibility of Good Field for Beef Cattle Raising Here. The amount of beef brought to St. John from Ontario has been increasing, indicating that the farmers of the province are not fully alive to their opportunities. Speaking of the matter yesterday, a local butcher said that it was rather difficult to get good beef cattle in this province. "Much of the beef sold in St. John is cow beef," he said. "The farmers keep a cow as long as she gives milk, and when she is old and useless for milking purposes they kill her and sell her for beef. Old cow beef is pretty tough, and not at all satisfactory to the fastidious. Hence large quantities of beef are imported from Ontario, where they make a business of raising beef cattle. Years ago before there was any talk of scientific farming, we used to get good beef in St. John from the country. Then the farmers used even to work in the woods and on their farms, and as they were always raising young steers they usually killed two or three fat and comparatively young ones each year, and sent the beef to the city.
