Roads in Bad State
A local farmer of the Petersburg road stated that the roads are in worse condition this year than at any in the last ten years. He also stated that farmers have helped dozens of cars out of the mud this spring.

At the Market
There was the usual good attendance, in spite of the rain, at the market this morning. The most enthusiastic were the buyers of pigs. There were several loads of porkers and buyers were not very slow. The prices ranged from \$7 to \$15 according to size and age. The prices of pork and beef were the same as last week. Hay sold at \$20 a ton which is \$1 less than last week. Potatoes sold at \$1.25 a bag. Apples were scarce; all prices were asked from 30 cents a basket to \$1.00 a bushel. All other vegetables were scarce. Maple syrup sold at the same price, \$2.75 a gallon and 75 cents a quart. Cheese sold at 25 to 30 cents a pound. Eggs were 45 cents a dozen. Butter sold at 55 cents a pound. Wood prices were the same. The farmers complained of the bad roads. Not many automobiles were out, the condition of the roads not permitting.

A Youth's Rash Act.
Penalties and laboring under the stigma of a recent Police Court conviction at Windsor, Walter H. Schroll, 22 years old, of Detroit, shot himself while in White's Cafe, Sandwich street, Ford, during a few hours later in the Hotel Dieu. Schroll, whose parents live at Reading, Penn., was discovered behind the counter of the cafe by the proprietor in the morning. Threatened by a revolver in the hands of Schroll, White fled from the cafe. He had gone but a few moments when a shot rang out. Returning, he found Schroll with a bullet wound in his left temple.

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Preston may have Athletic Association.
Preston report says.—The town of Preston is to organize an athletic association in the near future, when all branches of sport will be placed under the one body. Athletic associations have been organized in a number of the near-by cities and are working out satisfactorily, and there is no reason why one should not work out in Preston. If all athletic organizations are under one management there will be no friction which generally arises when the different branches of sport are under different officers.
