Let us labor in love and unity to preserve this monument, which reminds us of the faithful tollers of the past, and around which ever was, and can still be found some of the most staiwart tollers in the cause of Protestantism.

Imperial Protestant Federation

Autonomy Blils

These bilis have been so freely discussed in the House of Commons, and in public, that it is unnecessary for me to add anything to what has been already said in condemnation of the educational clauses contained therein and passed by the Parliament of Canada, forcing a Separate School System upon the new Western Provinces, seeking to divide a truly loyal and British colony.

Any system which will cause separation of the rising generation, be it educational or otherwise, is a detriment to the British Empire, and a kindling of hatred towards each other which cannot but work irreparable injury to any people or nation. Let our motto be, One Public School System, binding together the national life of our people, one fiag and one langu-

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
