Death Carries off one of the Maple City's Brightest Model School Students.

The sad and untimely death occurred Saturday night at 11 o'clock at the residence of his parents, Merlin, of Paul Guttridge, aged 18 years. Paul was well known in Chatham, having attended the C. C. I. for several years and was up to three weeks ago attending the local Model school.

He had been suffering for some time and for several days before his death symptoms of brain fever had been threatening, coupled with a steady failure of the heart's action, which took an alarming increase Saturday afternoon, terminating in his sad death by night.

The deceased was a genuine Christian lad and was highly esteemed by all who knew him. He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Guttridge, of Merlin, and nephew of Thos. and Jos. Guttridge, of this city. The Model school, in esteem for him, was closed this afternoon and a delegation from the school went to the funeral this afternoon.

FIERCE FRACAS

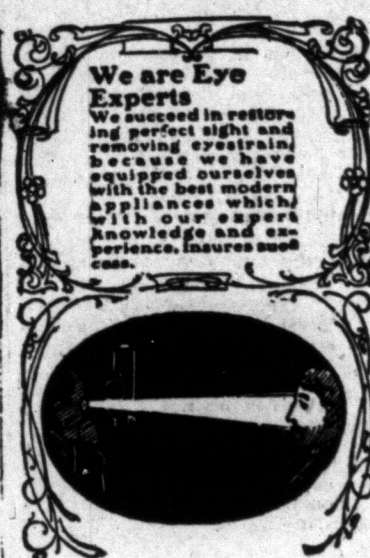
It Occurred in the Brooklyn Precincts of This Metropolis and Court Case Will Result.

That distinguished section of Chatham, known as Brooklyn West, which adds so much to the central region of the Maple City, was in a blaze of excitement, late Saturday afternoon. Hilarious sounds of conversation arose, likewise the strenuous shrieks of male combatants, one a depizan of the city, and the other a stranger within the gates, hailing from Chatham township.

A philosopher who attended the function declared that it indicated merely the prevailing fancy of the public for light entertainment.

Chief Young was sitting in his office Saturday afternoon, when he was hastily summoned to the vicinity of the Aberdeen Hotel, where he was told that Pete Browning was being murdered by Alf. Simmons. When the chief arrived on the scene, the principal actor had disappeared, but the officer learned from the spectators and from Pete Browning, the story of the fracas.

Alfred Simmons came in from Chatham township Saturday, and he was Pete Browning alleged, suffering from too long a gaze in the bowl from which flows cheerfulness and headaches. About this time Simmons met Pete. Armed with a rack stake, the man from Chatham township landed on Browning's skull, striking from the rear. The blow brought Browning to the ground and details were being filled in when spectators interfered. Browning said that he didn't see his assailant coming, or he would have been out of the way. The only reason he could give for the attack was that Simmons had had it in
