The result was, that I got the butter in 15 minutes, which was of much better quality, and more in quantity. I repeated the instructions the second time, the result was even more satisactory-I procured the butter in 121 minutes. If consider this alone worth ten times the price a your paper to me. Every farm house in the country should have a copy of the paper. I am so well pleased with it, that I shall try and get up a club for it. Please inform me where I can procure a good thermometer.
