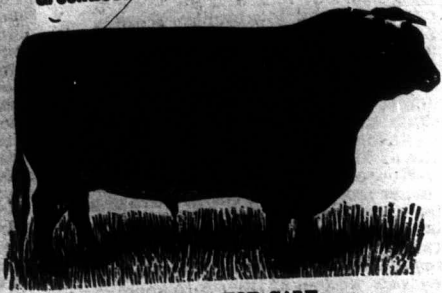

Imported Ayrshires and Guern- seys for Isaleigh Grange.

The *Scottish Farmer* in a recent issue says:
"Mr. John Cochran, Netherpool, despatched
from Kilmarnock for Liverpool on Thursday,
5th May, en route for Montreal, six head of
pedigree Ayrshires, purchased by Mr. T. D.
McCallum for Mr. J. N. Greenhills, Dan-
ville, Que. The lot consisted of Gem of Castle-
hill (8830), bred by Mr. Abram Kerr, and pur-
chased at Auchenbainie sale at a long price,
as also her bull calf by Wee Earl, the 100-
guinea bull at Burnhead sale. Gem is a per-
fect type of a dairy cow, has a first-class milk
vessel and the best of well-shaped teats, and
is to win in good company as a cow in milk.
Her one-year-old heifer made 30 ga. at Mr.
Hewitson's sale. Lady Nora of Fairfield
Mains, Monkton, a cow of good size and sub-
stance, has few equals as a big commercial
cow, and has won many first prizes for her
breeder at Kilmarnock, Monkton, Prestwick
and St. Quivox. Lady Buta of Mid-Ascog,
bred by Messrs. R. & J. McAllister, is a beau-
tiful grey, has few equals, and is as fine a spec-
imen of an Ayrshire as could be seen. She was
first at Glasgow, Ayr and Rothsay this season
as an unsold three-year-old, timed to calve
in July. We predict she won't be long on the
other side until she lets her presence be made
known. Two beautiful two-year-old heifers
bought at Auchenbainie sale—Nancy XXX.
of Auchenbainie (11252), sired by Yellow
Squire of Castlehill, now stock bull at Knock-
don, and Mary Ann IX. of Auchenbainie
(11262), by Choice Mixture of Auchenbainie—
although they have never been shown, could
leave their mark in any showyard. Their
color is of the very richest dark brown and
white. They have been recently served by
Royal Kyle of Bonshaw, the champion bull at
the Royal of England and Highland of Scot-
land, and all other shows wherever shown,
the property of Mr. Robert Reid, Bonshaw,
Stewarton. This is perhaps one of the most
select lots of pedigree Ayrshires that has
ever left this country, and cannot fail to be a
sure foundation for building up a herd of
Ayrshires. Mr. McCallum deserves the great-
est credit for his judgment in getting together
such a nice quality lot." Mr. McCallum also
visited the Island of Guernsey and purchased
seven beautiful animals, including the grand
young bull Masher III. from the greatest
prize-winning stock on the island, and having
every appearance of making a name for him-
self on this side. Two cows, two three-year-
old heifers and two two-year-old heifers are
also in the importation and are due to calve in
August. One of the cows, Princess II., is a
full sister to Deputy that won the first prize at
the World's Fair at Chicago. Mr. McCallum
also brought out some Yorkshire bears and
three collie bitches and a dog—rough-coated
sables, prize-winners and from working stock.

GOSSIP.

Pennsylvania has 1,100,000 dairy cows, which
are owned by 211,000 individuals. They make
on an average 140 lbs. of butter annually, which
on the basis of 30c. per lb., would net owners
over \$25 per year per cow.

There are 2,325 entries of live stock for the
Birmingham Show of the Royal Agricultural
Society (June 20 to 24), as compared with 2,688
at Manchester last year, 1,883 at Leicester in
1895, and 1,703 at Darlington in 1896. At the
Birmingham meeting there will be 709 entries
of horses, as compared with 861 at Manchester
last year; 792 cattle, as compared with 821;
624 sheep, as compared with 701; and 198 pigs,
as compared with 185 at Manchester.

Messrs. Macdonald, Fraser & Co. recently
held a special sale of 130 American horses at
Glasgow, Scotland, mostly of a high-class
carriage type, together with a few cobs and
"vanners." Buyers were present from Ire-
land, London, Eng., and Paris. The ages of
the animals ranged from five to seven years,
and height from 15.2 to 16.3 hands. The best
carriage horses realized from 70 to 100 guineas,
others bringing from 15 to 25 gu. Vanners
made from 50 to 60 gu.; cobs, 21 to 40 gu.; and
cart horses, 25 gu.

We would remind our readers of the dis-
persal sale of the fine herd of forty head of
Shorthorn cattle belonging to Messrs. E.
Gaunt & Sons, of St. Helen's, Ont., three miles
from Lucknow Station on the G. T. R., on
June 22nd. This is one of the largest and best
herds offered for sale in recent years. The
prospect for feed is good. Good cattle are too
scarce all over the country. Now is the time
to improve. If the cheap railway fares con-
ciding it will be a desirable trip to attend the
sale, and in any case those who have room for
good cattle should make it a point to be
present.

The annual sale of pedigree Hackneys be-
longing to Mr. Tom Mitchell was held at the
Park, Eccleshill, Eng., lately. Nearly seventy
horses were catalogued, but of these fifteen
were offered on behalf of Sir Frederick Ripley,
Bart., and Mr. W. Sugden. The highest price
of the day was paid for a Grand Master II.
two-year-old stallion, Islington, who secured
first prize at the London Hackney Show last
year and several other distinctions, the latest
of which was a premier award at Otley a few
weeks ago. After spirited bidding, Mr.
Rycoff, of Park Drive, Bradford, became the
purchaser at 265 gu. The yearling fillies were
a capital lot, a daughter of Lord Rattler, The
Bride, being sold to Mr. Powell, of Chislehurst,
for 205 gu.

Mr. W. D. Flatt, Hamilton, Ont., has recent-
ly sold his Trout Creek herd of Short-
horns to Hon. Thomas Greenway, Crystal
City, Man., to be exhibited at the Winnipeg
Industrial, and other western fairs, the ten
months' bull Crimmon Knight—28077—, by
Canada—19536—, a second prize winner
Toronto in '94, son of Village Bud of the
same family as the World's Fair champion,
Young Abbotsburn. The dam of Crimmon
Knight is Crimmon Jewel 2nd, by Imp. Hopeful,
and is of the favorite Crimmon Flower family.
He is a rich roan of very fine character and
quality, and will no doubt make his mark high
up in the prize lists, and as a sire. Mr. Flatt
reports his herd in fine shape, and the demand
for him for sale, and is not asking fancy
prices.
