With regard to the Duchies, the Government of Berlin seems disposed to seize the present opportunity of withdrawing its forces from the country side of the troops there, and backing out of the whole affair, leaving the Schleswigers to fight out their quarrel as best they may. It remains to be seen whether these appearances will be realized; the negotiations at Berlin are quite a farce; and it can only be by Prussia yielding up the whole point of quarrel, and leaving the rights of the parties, as they were before the war, that a lasting peace can be brought about. If we are to believe some of the German papers, the King of Prussia mediates some such tacit concessions, and it is to be hoped that the Germans will see the propriety of not renewing the war upon the frivolous grounds upon which they rushed into it.
