Glasgow Mail Oct. 7. CANADA AS AN EMIGRATION FIELD.

On Tuesday evening the Marquis of Lorne presided at a public meeting, held in the Parish Church of Inverary, for the purpose of hearing addresses from the Rev. Lauchlin Taylor, D. D., of Toronto, and Mr. Thomas Potts of New Brunswick, both of whom are under special appointment by the Canadian Government to urge the superior claims of Canada upon intending emigrants from this countra There was a large audience from town and

The Marquis of Lorne briefly introduced the first speaker, the Rev. Dr. Taylor, remarking that he had much pleasure in being present, both on account of the courses of study are full and varied. high recommendations borne by the gentlemen who were to address them, and also from the great importance of the subject. (Applause.) He did not require to bespeak them an attentive hearing from all

Dr. Taylor, who is a native of Argyleshire, and speaks with much of the old Celtic fire, then proceeded with his address. He said :- One out of every seven acres of dry land on the surface of the globe belonged to the British Empire, and more than one out of every five of earth's swarming millions yielded allegiance to Britain's Queen. (Applause.) As to the extent of Canada, he pointed out that it was only 13,296 miles less than the whole of Europe put together, namely, 3,581,744 square miles. The great North Western territory alone-obtained from the Hudson's Bay Company within the last six years—consisted of more than 2,000,000 square miles, or two-thirds of the size of the Continent; the whole constituting a territory of the most magnificent proportions prepared for the surplus population of the nationalities of Europe, and destined to become the great granary of the Old World. More than 111,000,000 acres of excellent land had lately been thrown into the market by a treaty with the Indians, with whom, as the present popular Gover-nor-General (Lord Dufferin) lately remarked we have always been on the best terms. The Doctor then gave a graphic description of the prairie lands of Mavitoba, over which for ten weeks he had travelled, through every diversity of landscape, clothed with vegetation of the most extensive ranges for cattle pasture on the face of the globe, and every yard of it could be ploughed. (Applause.) In one day he had seen herds of 80,000, and 100,-000 bison (buffalos) roaming over its undulating plains, while millions of prairie birds and water-fowl were met with at every step. Everything, in fact was there but-man; and man was the only thing wanted to complete and utilise it. The climate and geographical position of the Dominion were then minutely described, Toronto being shown to be only one degree farther north than Rome. He (Dr. Taylor) had lived there for many years, and he greatly preferred their climate to that of the old country—even their win-ter itself was more bracing and enjoyable. (Laughter.) He afterwards alluded to the Canada, which is allowed to be one of the best in the world, and which could beat even old Scotland itself. (Laughter.)

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
