The Attorney General gave notice, that he would bring in a Bill to be intituled "an Act to prevent the using or taking away boats, flats, or canoes, without the consent of the owners."

Mr. Makey moved that the Bill to repeal an Act made and passed in the thirty-sixth year of his late Majesty's Reign, intituled "an Act to prevent disorderly persons from taking and riding ocusing. the horses of others without their leaver or permission," receive the second reading.

Mr. M'Neill moved as an amendment that the said Bill receive the second reading this day six months: and the question being put on the amendment, the House divided,
