LIVE STOCK MARKETS TORONTO.

Receipts of live stock at the Union Stock Yards yesterday consisted of 103 cars, 1941 cattle, 174 calves, 1231 hogs, 385 sheep and lambs.

Butcher cattle were in strong demand yesterday at prices about steady with a week ago. The decline of last Thursday was more than recovered. The run of heavy steers was the best for many weeks and the percentage of high-priced cattle greater.

Heavy steers—Choice, \$10.20 to \$10.50; good, \$9.75 to \$10.

Butcher steers and heifers—Choice, \$9.75 to \$10.25; good, \$9 to \$9.50; medium, \$8.25 to \$8.75; common, \$6.75 to \$7.50.

Cows—Choice, \$7.75 to \$8.50; good, \$7 to \$7.50; medium, \$6.25 to \$6.75; common, \$5.50 to \$6.

Canners and cutters—\$4.75 to \$5.25.

Bulls—Choice, \$8.25 to \$8.75; good, \$7.50 to \$8; medium, \$7 to \$7.25; common, \$5.75 to \$6.50.

Stockers and feeders—Best, \$85 to \$100; medium, \$60 to \$75.

Lambs—Choice, 14c to 15c lb.; good, 13c to 14c lb.; culls, 9c to 12c lb.

Sheep—Light, 9 1-2c to 10 1-2c lb.; heavy fat, 7 1-2 to 9c lb.

Calves—Choice, 13c to 13c lb.; medium, 9 1-2c to 11 1-2c lb.; heavy fat, 7 1-2c to 9c lb.; common, 6c to 8 1-2 lb.

Hogs—Fed and watered, \$14.00; weighed off cars, \$14.25.

Leas—\$2.50 to \$3.50 per cwt. off sows, \$4 to \$5 per cwt. off stags, \$1 to \$2 per cwt. off light hogs and \$2 to \$3 per cwt. off thin feeder pigs, and one-half of one per cent government condemnation loss.


A very friendly game of nockey was played between the Moltke Stars and the Neustadt Tigers. It ended up very even the score being 7 to 6 in the T's favour.
