wan, two in British Columbia, and two in Alberta making a grand total of 27 new regiments.

Six new batteries of artillery will be organized, according to the statement of the minister of militia, and will be allotted as follows: One to Eastern Ontario and Quebec; one to the London district; two to the Toronto and Hamilton district; one to the Maritime Provinces and one to the West. The above force, including auxiliary units, will amount to nearly 35,000 men, larger than even the first contingent.

Recruiting officers have been and are being appointed all over Canada, in organizing centres. These will act continuously from corps to corps and there will be no cessation to recruiting. Men will be enlisted for overseas service without being attached to any one unit in the meantime. During the summer months the men will be sent to the various training camps every week then be allotted to their respective corps.

IMPORTANT MATTERS

Mrs. W. S. Bates is furnishing a private room in the new building on the Women's floor. Most attractive furniture has been selected for it, and we hope to see it completed in ten days or two weeks.

FOUR MORE PRIVATE WARDS: The furniture removed from the two rooms in the main hospital consisted of a mahogany dressed, single wardrobe and washstand. The furniture is good and when polished and slight repairs made, with the expenditure of about fifty dollars to buy chairs, bedside tables, rug, etc., the rooms can be made to look very attractive and will complete the furnishing of the four private wards in the new building.

The dishes, silverware, and linen for the private patients, trays have been purchased, and will soon be put in use, and will be greatly appreciated by both patients and nurses.

WORK OF THE JUNIOR HOSPITAL AID. The walls and wood work of the maternity ward, nursery, and delivery-room have been painted and cleaned, the grate repaired, and a new hearth put in, and is now about ready for occupancy. We feel sure it will be a lasting source of gratification to the Junior Hospital aid to know how much it is going to mean to the nurses in their obstetrical training to have their patients in one ward and a distinct room for the babies, and not have to carry them all over the hospital to find their mothers. The J. H. A. have provided a pair of accurate scales and many small articles which the service has never had, besides the very generous furnishing of the whole equipment.

IN GENERAL. The eight beds newly painted have been placed in the maids' quarters, and the old ones removed. They add greatly to the appearance of the rooms.

A temporary apparatus has been rigged up in the operating room for the boiling of the water needed and will stand until the new operating room is ready, we hope, if not too long.

An accident will almost certainly occur if the notice is not observed. Steps should be taken to enforce the rule or close the entrance to all but pedestrians.

The driving shed as it now stands between the main building and the new wards, is a great eyesore and might be removed to some less prominent place.

Wheel chairs are badly needed. The stock consists of six, two of these have been sent out for repairs and at present there is only one for each floor. It is a proposition a nurse can hardly solve, how to make one wheel chair do duty for approximately 24 patients.

We are indebted to Miss Bishop for a heavy oak rocker for use in the sun parlor, and to Mr. Lyons for an electric reading lamp.

Mrs. Wilkes and Mrs. Gould representing the Women's Hospital aid brought books, fruit, flowers, etc., for the public ward patients.

ACTION TAKEN. The board decided to close the front driveway to the hospital because of the danger of rigs and autos meeting on the hilly and winding road. Pedestrians only will, in future, be able to use this entrance way, and all classes of vehicle will have to use the back entrance to the building.

Votes of thanks were passed to Miss Bishop, Mr. Lyons and the Buck estate for their gifts.

Others matters in the report of the Superintendent were also suitably dealt with.

The date of the next graduation for nurses was fixed for October with the second Wednesday, each June after that.

NEW OPERATING ROOM. It was decided to at once go ahead with the installation of a new operating room on the third floor, and the special committee, on which Dr. Secord and Dr. Fissette, are representatives from the Medical Association were empowered to take the necessary steps. The purchase of an outfit of sterilizers will be one of the first items.
