## SUBMARINE RAID ON MADEIRA

French Gunboat and Two Other Vessels Sunk Off Coast

### ISLAND BOMBARDED

Resulting in Death of 34 Persons—Small Damage.

London, Dec. 6.—The French gunboat Surprise has been sunk by German submarines at Funchal, Madeira, according to an announcement by the Portuguese Minister of Marine in a wireless despatch received here from Lisbon. Thirty-four of the crew of the gunboat perished.

A few Portuguese were also killed aboard the steamers Kangaroo and Dacia, which were torpedoed, according to the despatch.

A despatch to the Exchange Telegraph from Lisbon states that thirty-four persons were killed in the bombardment of Funchal. The submarines shelled the shore for two hours, especially the public buildings, but only small damage was done. The steamers Kangaroo and Dacia were torpedoed.

The Dacia was a British cable-laying steamer of 1,866 tons, and was owned in London. The Kangaroo was a French steamer of 2,413 tons. Her home port was Havre.

The gunboat Surprise was a vessel of 626 tons. She was 184 feet long, and carried a complement of 109 men. The Surprise was built in 1895.

Shell Maderia's Capital.

Paris, Dec. 6.—A despatch to the Havas Agency from Lisbon dated Monday says a submarine fired fifty shells at Funchal, capital of the island of Madeira. The population, frightened, fled, and only returned when the submarine departed in an intense fire from the fortress.

The despatch states that the fire from the submarine struck a ship, killing six Portuguese sailors.

was a wedge into the province of all labor claimed by all women.

Miss Garvin

It is a promising sign of the times that women are being allowed to voice their views in public, were the opening remarks used by Miss Josephine Garvin, to bring the question to the attention of the gathering.

### LICK HANDS OF THE CANADIANS

Hungry Bosches Are Eager to be Taken Prisoners

London, Dec. 6.—Canadian officers recently returned from the front in Belgium, the scene of the development of bombing operations.
