Solemn Induction Service
For New Pastor of St. Paul's Church
HELD LAST EVENING
Rev. W. Scott Fulton New Rector of Simcoe's Anglican Church

Simcoe, Aug. 3.—(From Our Own Correspondent) Not since January 1890 had there been an induction ceremony at St. Paul's Presbyterian church here, till last evening when Rev. W. Scott Fulton, M.A., B.D., was formally installed as pastor, and successor to Dr. W. J. Dey.
There was a good representative congregation for the occasion and the more tempered atmosphere and bright moonlight for those from a distance, made conditions ideal.
Rev. Jno. Robertson, of Port Dover, presided. Rev. A. W. Hare, performing the office of addressing the minister, incidentally recording a protest against the "archaic" custom of having one clergyman admonish another in the presence of the congregation.
Rev. W. J. West of Dunnville addressed the congregation briefly and the pastor's sermon was dispensed with. The preliminary meeting of Presbytery at 7.15 was attended by no other ministers than those mentioned.
Immediately before the induction and in the presence of the congregation the new incumbent received from the ladies of the church, a pulpit gown. While Mrs. W. P. Innes adjusted the clerical robe, Mrs. L. C. Gibson read the following address:
Salutation—On this, the eve of your induction as pastor, the ladies of St. Paul's Presbyterian Church take great pleasure in presenting you with this gown. We hope it may keep you so warm in winter and so cool in summer that it shall be a means among others of keeping you here till it has grown threadbare and shabby and another is needed to take its place.
Please accept it as an expression of our sincere good will, loyalty, and sympathetic co-operation in the work upon which you are entering.
Signed on behalf and in the name of the Ladies of St. Paul's:

During the proceedings the choir sang very impressively, "How Lovely are the Messengers." (Mendelssohn.)
The induction service over, the congregation repaired to the school room where a social hour was spent. The beautiful and chaste decorations were the result of Miss Lawson's leadership.
The New Pastor.
Rev. J. Scott Fulton is Scotch blood and Irish birth, as Ian Mac-haren would say, "a Scotchman who went over to Ireland to get born."
Hailing from Co. Dover, he took his arts course at Belfast, three years' Divinity at Edinburgh, and a post-graduate course at Princeton university, whence his degree B. D. He also took his M. A. in philosophy at Princeton.
In July 1909 he was ordained and inducted at Sharon, Presbyterian church, Stettartan, N. S. After serving there four years he went to St. Louis, from which he returned some months since. He was re-admitted to the church in Canada at the recent meeting of the General Assembly and through the Toronto Presbytery, on July 2nd. He was transferred to the Hamilton Presbytery on July 11th.
His pulpit ability is outstanding. He gets away from the rigid-
