Pte. Ward Fisher Killed

Among the list of the heroic dead of the great allied counter offensive is the name of Pte. Ward Fisher, Jr. son of Mr. and Mrs. Ward Fisher, 37 Somerset street, reported killed in action August 8th.

Pte. Fisher was a student at Acadia University Collegiate Academy in August 1915, at the age of 17 years, and just passed his 20th year when killed. He was transferred to the 40th Battalion in England, and on going to France last year was attached to the 25th Canadian Reserve Battalion. He was an expert machine gunner and a cheerful and adventurous comrade.

Save Peach Stones and Save Soldiers.

The Board of Trade has become a collection station and a large sugar barrel has been placed outside the room at the corner of Main and Duncan streets. This action has been taken by Secretary Reed and Charles C. Cressy as a result of the publicity already given. 100 peach stones will make charcoal enough for one gas mask. The American Army needs millions of them. Hundreds of peaches are consumed every day in Gloucester and saving the stones and bringing them to the Board of Trade will be an easy way to help general Pershing's men in France. A prize of \$1 will be given to the boy or girl bringing in the largest number of peach stones next week.

Five Thousand Prisoners Have Been Taken in Two Days Fighting

London, August 22.—The town of Albert, eighteen miles northeast of Amiens on the Ancre River, has been recaptured by the British who also have obtained all their objectives in the fighting today between Bray-sur-Somme and Albert, according to official communication from Field Marshal Haig last night. Sheep Pay Best of all Live Stock in Nova Scotia

High Prices for Wool and Mutton are assured for some years AFTER THE WAR Now is THE TIME TO INCREASE Nova Scotia Flocks. Keep Your Ewe Lambs

If you have more than you need induce your neighbours to purchase them for breeding purposes. Do not sell them to the butcher unless you cannot help it.

1918 legislation requires the compulsory taxation of every dog in Nova Scotia and provides for paying compensation to owners of sheep destroyed by dogs, the owners of which are not known. Now let every farmer who can, help meet war demands by keeping sheep.

The Nova Scotia Department of Agriculture in co-operation with the Live Stock Division of the Dominion Department of Agriculture, announce the following policies.

- 1.—Several hundred selected grade ewe lambs have been purchased and will be sold at cost to bona fide sheep breeders wishing to secure them.
- 2.—The Departments will pay transportation on these ewe lambs from place of purchase to destination.
- 3.—If parties wishing to secure ewe lambs for breeding purpose will write the Nova Scotia Department of Agriculture, Truro, they will get advice relative to price and other particulars. If all lambs already secured are disposed of, an effort will be made to purchase more. Get orders in early, as later prices may be higher.
- 4.—The Live Stock Division of the Federal Department of Agriculture will assist as heretofore the distribution of pure bred rams.
- 5.—To supplement the distribution of pure bred rams, the Provincial Department of Agriculture will secure and ship at cost, high class unregistered ram lambs at slightly higher than butcher prices.
- 6.—Mr. S. A. Logan, in charge of Sheep Extension Work of the Nova Scotia Department of Agriculture will, as far as possible, call on parties wishing help with their sheep flocks or requiring further information in regard to the increasing of their flocks.
