GRAND ORANGE LODGE
Majority Favors the Exclusion of Dealers in and Manufacturers of Liquor.

London, June 1.—The Grand Orange Lodge meeting ended yesterday. The members sat nearly all the night before discussing a resolution introduced by Bro. H. H. Pitts, ex-M.P.P. of Fredericton, N. B., which proposed to render ineligible for membership of the order all dealers in and manufacturers of intoxicating liquor. The debate was a very warm one. Speeches in support of the resolution were made by the mover, Deputy Grand Master Armstrong, Grand Secretary J. C. Gass, Hon. Dr. McFadden, Grand Master of Manitoba; Provincial Grand Secretary Connolly, of Winnipeg; Grand Master Gilday and Past Grand Master Galbraith, of Quebec, and the several chaplains present. The speakers in opposition included Dr. Beattie Nesbitt, Toronto; J. H. Holmes, Dumfries, and H. H. Holland, of Port Hope.

The resolution was all but carried. A two-third vote was necessary, and the vote stood:—Yeas 74, nays 52.

Notice of motion was immediately given that the matter would be brought before the Grand Lodge again next year. Most of the eastern and Manitoba delegates favored the resolution.
