British Minister Sends Cipher Despatch Dated Pekin.

Assaults on the Legations Closed July 16-German Officials

HE IS HEARD FROM

London, Tuesday, July 31, 4,30 a. m -Sir Claude McDonald's welcome despatch, dated Pekin, July 21, and resides as dispelling any doubt that might still have existed regarding the genuineness of the despatches. Owing to an error in transmission the message fails to show the number of wounded. He may be under the impression that the Government is fully posted regarding all recent occurrences. Apart from this despatch there is practically no fresh news, although a special from Tien-Tsin asserts that the British and American forces are getting ready to American forces are getting ready to advance within 48 hours. Li-Hung-Chang remains at Shanghai. He says

that the great heat has prevented him continuing the journey to Pekin, FROM BRITISH MINISTER. The Admiralty has made public the following despatch from Rear Admiral Bruce at Tien-Tsin:—"Following message from Pekin:—"British legation, June 20 to July 16, repeatedly attacked by Chinese troops on all sides, both rifle and artillery fire. Two Commandoes Lay Down Their Arms to General Hunter

Others Expected—This is the End of Resistance in the Free

Bloemfontein, July 31.-Gen. Hunter, having received a written unconditional rrender of all the Boers in Caledon Valley. stended to accept the surrender. Gen.

Prinsloe, lately elected to the chief command, arrived, and tried to repudiate the unconditional surrender. Gen. Hunter, however, refused any concessions, except to allow the Boers to keep one riding horse. About 11 o'clock the troops were drawn up in two long lines on the hills and over the valley, and the Boers rode in between, throwing down their rifles, together with a motley collection of clothing, blankets and gear such as was found in General kets and gear such as was found in General Cronje's laager. The Ficksburg command was first to lay down arms, consisting of about 550 men. Then came the Ladybrand commando, with about 450. Fifteen horses, two guns and 50 wagons were given up. Gen. Prinsloo and Commandant Crowther were received by Gen. Hunter at his tent, where they were well treated and accorded every courtesy. Many of the Boers have gone to Naauwport, and will surrender to General McDonald. Others are still arriving here. The Harrismith and Vrede commandoes are yet, at large, as well as some Boers who got out of the valley at night, but the prisoners say that those outside will surrender, and that this will practically end the Free State army. The Boers say they would not have surrendered had they not been surrounded. The prisoners have been placed in a laager under guard, and will be kept there until all arrive,

They Were Found on the Banks of the Welland Canal,

After a Guard Had Exchanged Shots With Some More Supposed

Dynamiters. Port Dalhousie, July 31. Following closely on the finding of a box of dynamite on the bank of the Cornwal canal comes what looks like another attempt on the Welland waterway. As little after midnight on Saturday morning, Peter Matheson, lock-tender at lock 18, saw a man endeavoring to pass down the canal to the point where it crosses over the Grand Trunk tunnel. This spot is the most open to the designs of miscreants of any on the canal. Mathieson ordered the stran-egr off, and his actions in response were so suspicious that the man at the lock followed him until he took refuge in a quarry near by and was lost to sight. A short while after, about one o'clock, Patrolman Gunn, of the Dominion police, on duty further down at the west end, near the tunnel, saw at the west end, near the tunnel, saw two men coming up towards him. He called on them to halt. Instead of doing so, one of them called to his companion, "Give it to him," meaning Gunn. The officer was standing in the light, where he was an easy mark, and two shots from a revolver were fired at him in rapid reply, and the men bolted. It is thought here that long chances are being run in leaving unarmed men to do battle with desperadoes. Chief McKinnon favors the arming of the lock tenders with rifles, which could be kept in the lock houses for an emergency.
