### ONE HORSEPOWER.

How This Unit of Mechanical Force Came to Be Adopted.

en men first begin to become fa ar with the methods of measuring mechanical power, they often speculate on where the breed of horses is to be found that can keep at work raising 33,000 pounds one foot per minute, or the equivalent, which is more familiar to some mechanics, of raising 330 pounds 100 feet per minute. Since 33. is called one horsepower it is natural that people should think the engineers this work does not exist.

The horsepower unit was established by James Watt about a century ago, and the figures were fixed in a curious way. Watt found that the average horse of his district could raise 22,000 pounds one foot per minute. At that time Watt was employed in the manufacture of engines, and customers were so hard to find that all kinds of artithing; to feel tired before is another. ficial inducements were necessary to induce power users to buy steam engines. As a method of encouraging them Watt offered to sell engines reckuning 33,000 foot pounds to a horsepower. And thus he was the means of giving a false unit to one of the most important measurements in the world.

> Southey on Coleridge. In 1806, Southey writes, says Harold S.
