Dominion Day.

A nation is a potent factor in the life of humanity. Its influence upon its own people is very great. Their character, their ideals, their power will be determined to a considerable degree by the general standing, ideals, and impulses of the nation.

Everything, therefore, which tends to build up a national sentiment bears directly upon the people's welfare. To inspire the people with national feelings, to give them courage, intelligence and strength to all workers.

Canada has her birthday celebrations. The first of July is marked by certain observances. The public business is suspended; the merchants close their stores; the excursions to distant points are numerous; the sports provided are abundant.

This we think a mistake. It would be a gain to have some assembling of the citizens where prominent public men could address the people on civic duties and privileges. As things are the only discussion that takes place on national questions comes at election times when calm thought is difficult to secure.

If our Council or the Citizens League, or some other body would take the matter up and make suitable arrangements for securing addresses by leading statesmen, probably succeeding years would witness a repetition of the ceremony with increasing profit to our country's life.

The puerile attempt at rejoinder on the part of our baby content, this week, although containing the usual amount of deviation from fact, is withal highly amusing. We are sorry that so few of its readers will be able to understand just what it does say. It requires some time to become accustomed to its style. While not wishing to occupy our space with such trivial matters we must ask to be excused from accepting the statement sent the bona-fide side of the 250 cent-union until some better testimony is offered than has already been submitted.

Lord Rosebery, England's Prime Minister, has resigned, the result of an adverse vote in the Commons on Friday last, when the government was defeated on the motion of the Hon. William St. John F. Broderick, Conservative member for the Gullford division of Surrey, to reduce the salary of the Secretary of War by £100 on account of an alleged deficiency in the army stores and munitions of war, chiefly cordite.

The ceremonies in connection with the unveiling on the 17th inst., by Governor Daly of the monument at Louisburg, in commemoration of the great siege in 1745, were carried out without a hitch. The display was gorgeous, music grand, and the speeches and addresses in good taste.

It is stated on good authority that a steamer will be placed on the route between Montreal and Cape Town, South Africa, on the first of August to be followed by regular monthly sailings from the St. Lawrence in summer and a marine line port in winter.

Upwards of four hundred baptisms were reported for the past year.

Russia has completely outwitted the Germans in the matter of the Chinese loan. Germany left England differing from her on the far eastern question and was ejected into joining France and Russia to coerce Japan. She has reaped her reward, Russia makes the neat little sum of \$800,000 a year out of the transaction straight, with prospects of more so far as China is concerned, and Germany gets left. France is trying to see just where she has gained anything by backing Russia, but so far they have been unsuccessful. It is very amusing especially to English financiers who will simply bide their time for the big loan which must follow in a few months. Then it will be their turn to get in on the ground floor. The German emperor is more than angry. He is savage and intends to discipline the whole diplomatic corps. England as usual is taking things calmly, knowing full well that there can be no permanent settlement of any question in which her interests are involved without she is satisfied therewith. Rosebery can be relied upon to look out for England's interests.—Ez.

Money in Spruce Gum. Quite a trade in spruce gum is carried on by dealers in some sections of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick. The demand for this article is greater than the dealers can supply in Boston and other cities. Certain parts of Nova Scotia offer a good field for this enterprise. Few people in Nova Scotia have an idea of the value of spruce gum. In speaking to a reporter of the St. John Telegraph the other day a reliable merchant of that city said: "I was talking with a man the other day about business matters and during the conversation asked him if he would not like to buy a carload of sugar. He hesitated for a moment and then decided that he would. 'I sold four barrels of spruce gum at Boston the other day,' he said, 'and that will buy me the carload of sugar.' He bought the sugar and paid for it about \$650, all of which he made by the sale of four barrels of gum."

The charge of abortion preferred against Dr. Miller, of Bridgetown, and James Parker, for procuring and administering noxious drugs upon Grace Fegan, one of Miss Stirling's proteges, has attracted great interest.
