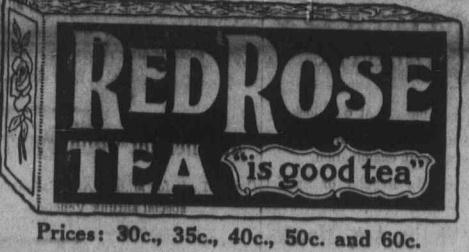

In Old Annapolis.

Annapolis, formerly Port Royal, was a "garrison town" from the time of its founding by De Monts in 1604, until, in 1851, it ceased to be the capital of the Province of Nova Scotia and the troops were withdrawn and stationed at Halifax, and is therefore the oldest settlement in Canada.

Just how comfortably the early residents of Annapolis lived, and with how much affluence, is seen in the description given in the writings of M. Dierville, who was in Port Royal about 1699. The town had then been settled over ninety years, and so had arrived to very fair pretensions as a pioneer in the wilderness, although no more progress had been made than was the necessary outcome of an increased immigration.

Of the residents, Dierville says—"They fed themselves and have surplus to sell. Hemp and flax prosper. Some use no other cloth but homespun. Fruits, pulse and garden stuffs are excellent. Provisions are cheap; wheat 40 sous per bushel, the bushel weighs forty-one and one-half pounds; beef is two sous a pound; a pair of chickens, 10 sous; eggs, five sous per dozen; and hares four sous apiece. (A sou is a cent in our currency.) Game plenty. The town of Port Royal knew the country well before they selected it as their fortress. They had forts at La Tour, at Le Have and at Muscouabou. These all belonged to individuals, and when a good understanding existed among them, which was but rarely, they used to come to Port Royal for refreshments. But it is to be remarked that except at Port Royal and Le Have, where they cultivated lands and carried on the fisheries, the other posts were only kept up for trading with the savages. Port Royal is, then, the general store of the country and for supplying it protects Minas also, where corn is now raised and cattle."

The first Town Council of Annapolis after its final occupation by the English was organized in the spring of 1720 by Governor Phillips. The members of that board were ten in number. The first work of this council was evidently in the line of superintendence of public repairs. The town was in a bad condition according to the report of Governor Phillips. When was landed in April he found the place in as bad a state as was possible to describe, both within and without.

The criminal courts of these early councils were the occasions of decidedly amusing proceedings. The Jean Picoit affair and her sentence to "ducking at high water" have become familiar in history, and other sentences to the early offenders of justice were equally strange and ridiculous. In September, 1716, one Robert Nicols was charged with assaulting one of the officers of the garrison, and a court of four councillors found him guilty and passed the following sentence—
