

THE GRAFTERS MUST GO

The Steel Strike

WASHINGTON, Sept. 25.—Investigation of a nation-wide steel strike by the Senate Labor Committee which begins today, was called to determine "if the situation in any way can be relieved by Federal action." John Fitzpatrick, Chairman of the Strikers' Organization, has assured the Committee he would present labor's side of the controversy and he was summoned as first witness. Judge Cary was summoned to present the other side of the controversy, but will be unable to appear until next week. He will be asked to make a detailed statement and then submit to cross examination.

14 Men Injured

MONTREAL, Sept. 25.—Fourteen men were injured at the Canadian Vickers Shipbuilding Plant at 3.15 o'clock this afternoon when a gas tank upon a ship under construction exploded. Then men were rushed to the hospital suffering from burns. Three of the cases are said to be serious. One man is dead at the hospital, a second man is reported dying of his injuries.

"Telegram" Lie Nailed Greenspond Will Settle Morine's Hash in November
