to exterminate first the treacher-  
ous English and then walk over  
General French's contemptible  
little army."

### POLICE BELLS INSTALLED

The bell which was rung for half an

are being made to stamp it out here.

Stories told by the wounded soldiers have given the people enough  
facts to show the Austrian armies are completely overwhelmed. This is  
confirmed by the fact that work on the fortifications around Vienna are  
being hastened.

Batteries are being placed and mines being laid. Sentries are on duty  
day and night. All persons suspected of being Servians or Montenegrins  
are arrested. No one is permitted to approach the districts in which  
defensive works are being erected.

### Russians Continue to Repulse Germans

(Special to The News)

Petrograd—Continued success of Russian attacks on the German  
invaders in Russian Poland is announced in a despatch from Grand Duke  
Nicholas, commander in chief. This is the seventh day of the conflict  
precipitated by the Germans in an attempt to cross the Niemen and take  
the fortress of Ossowiec. It is stated by the war office they have failed  
in both efforts and large reinforcements are being sent from the West  
to assist them.

### Allies Repulse Hostile Forces

(Special to The News)

London—Reuter Telegraph Co. gave out the following statement via  
Amsterdam—Hostile forces advancing north and south of Albert (a town  
in France near Amiens), have been repulsed. Front battle line is without  
news.

"In Argonne the attack is progressing steadily though slowly.

"Yesterday the enemy advanced in Alsace Lorraine. His attacks  
were energetically repulsed.

"In the eastern theatre war there is no new."

### Servians Repulse Austrians

(Special to The News)

Nish—It is officially announced the Servians on the Drina-Shabits  
front repulsed the Austrians toward Parachitsa with enormous losses.  
"Firing is hear in the direction of Mkintsa-Klenka," the statement  
adds.

"There is undoubtedly fierce firing in the enemy's territory."

### Germans Attempt to Land at Windau

(Special to The News)

Petrograd—A German fleet of forty ships appeared off Windau on  
Sept. 24, but were prevented from landing forces by the Russian forts.  
The ships withdraw but the following day two cruisers returned destroy-  
ing the lighthouse. A Civilian and a number of soldiers were killed but  
the ships were again driven off by the forts.

### Retreat Beginning

London, Oct. 1.—3.25 a.m.—A Rotter-  
dam despatch to the Daily News says:

"Despatches from the south indicate  
that preparations for the retreat of  
the German right have already begun.

German troops have been observed com-  
ing from the north of France toward  
Tournai and Mons prepared to cover the  
main army in case of retreat."

### Five Bridges Over Meuse

London, Oct. 1, 5 a.m.—A telegram  
to the Express from 'Olen' says that  
the Germans have removed all their  
wounded from Brussels and have con-  
structed five pontoon bridges over the  
Meuse between Givet and Namur, ap-  
parently to aid in a contemplated retreat.

### Danger of Over-Confidence

London, Sept. 30.—Lord Roberts in  
an article in the Hibbert Journal urges,  
not to under-estimate the power of Ger-  
many with its sixty-six million of people.

"I cannot help thinking," he writes,  
"that the great task of subduing that na-  
tion will begin when we, with our French,  
Russian and Belgian allies, have driven  
the Germans into the heart of their own  
territory."

"May I give a word of caution to my  
fellow countrymen against the unpopu-  
lar practice of abusing one's enemies.

Let us avoid what Kipling during the Boer  
war describes as 'killing Kruger with our  
mouths.' Let us rather evoke all our  
energy to defeating our foe by the  
superior fighting of adequate num-  
bers of British soldiers in the open field.

"When we read the charges against  
the German troops let us remember that  
gross charges, absolutely untrue, were  
brought against our own brave soldiers  
fighting in South Africa, but whether the  
charges are true or not let us keep our  
own hands clean and let us fight against  
the Germans in such a way as to earn  
their liking as well as their respect."

### Zouaves Added Glory

Paris—The Zouaves are reported by re-  
turning wounded soldiers to be covering  
themselves with glory on the allies' left.

It is related that one day recently the  
French were obliged to recede under a  
tremendous pressure of numbers and left  
eight 3-inch guns in the hands of the enemy.

This enraged the Zouaves, who begged  
to be allowed to get them back and recapture  
the position.

When trumpets sounded for the charge  
and the Zouaves bounded forward many  
turned their heads as they did not wish to  
see what they thought was sure to hap-  
pen to them, but on they went, singing,  
shouting and defying the rain of machine

guns. A great proportion fell on the way,  
but the rest pressed forward until they  
pounced on the enemy's line. It seemed  
then as if there were only a few flashes  
of cold steel before the enemy broke and  
the cannon were trained on the fleeing  
foe to avenge the Zouaves who had fallen  
in the heroic charge.

### British Cavalry Behead Enemy

London, Oct. 1.—Edgar Allen Cant-  
rell, an American who has arrived here  
from Belgium, says he talked with a  
wounded German officer who said that  
the British cavalry were devils. He said  
they charged standing up in shortened  
stirrups, and that the swing of their sab-  
res, beheaded their enemies. They hand-  
ed their horses like ponies on a polo field.

### Prussian Casualties 90,000

London—A despatch to the evening  
News from Copenhagen says the Prus-  
sian casualties shows 90,000 men killed,  
wounded and missing. Of this 1,000 are  
officers.

### Another British Ship Sunk

(Special to The News)

Callos, Oct. 1.—The British steamer  
Banksfield was sunk off the Peruvian  
coast by the German cruiser Leipzig.  
Her crew arrived here today on board the  
steamer Marie.

### General Situation Satisfactory

Paris, Oct. 1.—Complete success ap-  
pears to have attended the great flanking  
movement designed to encircle and cut  
off the right wing of the German armies  
under Generals Von Kluck and Von Boe-

Bohm. The centre of activity has lifted  
north of the Somme, where the enveloping  
movement is being pushed with the great-  
est vigor. The war office statement that  
in this region "the action continues to  
develop more and more toward the north"

is weighty with significance. The latter  
official bulletin, issued at midnight last  
night, says, "The general situation is  
satisfactory."

The French and British now have ad-  
vanced to position north of the Somme,  
which effectively cut off Von Kluck's  
retreat to the northeast. Junville, Von  
Kluck's sole remaining immediate base  
of supplies, with its single line of railway,  
is in a precarious situation. The allied  
line to the south of Junville is pressing  
the German line inward and northward,  
and the French and British, operating  
from a northwesterly direction, is closing  
in on this position. Further appreciable  
advances by either of the allied armies  
will force Von Kluck and Von Boehm  
either to retreat by way of Rethel, the  
only road left open to him toward Bel-  
gium, or make a stand, with every pros-  
pect of the allies turning his admitted  
defeat into disaster.

### French Occupy Seicheprey

Reports from the front published by  
the war office show steady advances by  
the French right operating in the southern  
part of the Woivre region. Here six  
days ago the Germans held a line extend-  
ing from Richecourt to Liroville, in-  
tersecting the town of Seicheprey. Heavy  
fighting, with severe losses on both sides  
has continued for six days and today the  
French succeeded in occupying Seiche-  
prey and also have succeeded in gaining a  
foothold on the slopes of the Rupt-de-  
Mad in Meurthe-et-Moselle.

In spite of the fact that this is official  
that "there is no other appreciable change  
at the front," the population of Paris  
will not be denied its celebration of the  
attainment of the second great victory  
over the German army of invaders.
