Mabel Foster spent the Easter holidays with her sister, Mrs. G. W. Hopkins of Hartland.

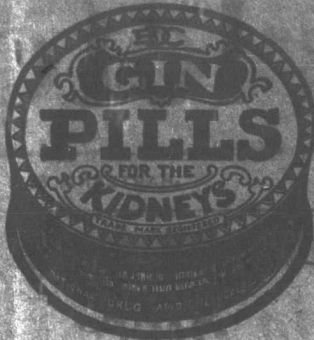
LOWER BRIGHTON NEWS
