U. N. B. Basketball Team Defeated St. John Y. M. C. A. Five by 41 to 17 Last Night

Visitors Due for Trip to Upper Canada in Near Future and Believe They Can Defeat Red and Black Team in Return Game at St. John.

The U. N. B. basketball team defeated the St. John Y. M. C. A. in a fast game in the College Gymnasium last night by the score of 41 to 17.

The game was closely contested from the start and both of the teams used combination play throughout the game, almost all of the scoring being made from combinations. At the opening of the game neither of the teams could get going as both were marking closely. After three minutes of play U. N. B. scored their first field throw and after the next ten minutes the score stood 11 to 9 in favor of the Red and Black. Margetta broke the spell when he scored a foul. At the end of the period the score stood 18 to 5 in favor of U. N. B.

In the second half the Red and Black increased their lead, making 75 points to their opponents' 12, the total score being 41 to 17.

Both teams used a considerable amount of combination during the game and very little individual work

was attempted, although the Y. M. C. A. lost some good chances to score by taking long shots. Roy Willet and Murray Nixon were the pick of the Y. M. C. A. team, both showing up well in combination.

The U. N. B. team was well balanced, although they showed their greatest strength on defence. Dummer played a good game at forward and Bridges made good use of his reach and scored on a number of rebounds.

Chatham Expects to Win From Fredericton Tonight

(Unbeaten N. B. H. L. Teams to Clash in Crucial Game)

Players, Accompanied by a Big Party of Supporters, Arrived Today Confident of Beating Marysville Tomorrow Night, Too—Trouble in Chatham Team Over Selection of Goaltender.

Confident that they can win from Fredericton tonight and Marysville tomorrow night in spite of the much-discussed selection which has recently threatened their team, the Chatham Hockey Club arrived here at noon today by C. N. R. for the crucial game of the New Brunswick Hockey League championship race.

Manager Ken Brea was in charge of the party, which occupied a car which had been placed at their disposal, and as Capt. Anthony Veniot and the nine other players who were brought along filed off the train they expressed confidence that the Chatham team would have a mortgage on the Chestnut Cup when they return home on Friday morning.

This afternoon the Chatham squad were expected to have a short workout at the Arctic Rink, although there was some thought of giving the players an afternoon's rest because of the early start they had had to make this morning. All the Chatham squad were out of bed at 4 a. m. to catch the train and the management thought the players might be better off with a rest this afternoon, depending upon a good workout before the game this evening.

Fredericton Players in Shape. The Fredericton team had their final tuning up for tonight's game at the Arctic Rink last evening, although most of the local team were out in the afternoon with the U. N. B. squad when the Red and Black had their best practice of the season. The college players all looked to be in good shape and the only member of the local squad showing any effects of puck-chasing is Archie Williams, who was painfully cut about the eye by a blow from one of the other players' stick during the U. N. B. workout. There was around town today, however, and said he felt fit except for the discoloration of his cheek.

Sandy Staples is to referee the game tonight and has a difficult position to fill because of his connection with the Fredericton Club. However, he has filled the bill before under similar conditions and can do it again. Indications point to another big crowd, but the fans are pretty sure to be on hand early tonight. Manager Beatty will be in charge of the ticket selling, and with no possibility of another big crowd at the entrance, it is expected the game will get going promptly at 8 o'clock.—J. D. B.

BATHURST WON FROM CAMPBELLTON TEAM

Surprise of the Hockey Season on the North Shore Sprung by Orange and Black.

Bathurst, Feb. 17.—The Bathurst hockey team have shaken the flux which has been following them this season, and scored a victory over the Campbellton hockey team. Although not the first win of the Orange and Black it is the most important. Campbellton, after having made a triumphant tour of the provinces, defeating such teams as the Moncton Vics and Chatham, succumbed to defeat before the fast Bathurst team.

Playing on a sheet of ice rendered very heavy by recent mild weather, which made the going hard at times, both teams soon became accustomed to conditions and the play was fast and furious. Bathurst started the excitement when Schryer made one fine rush to sag the net for the first tally. The "Vets" then recovered themselves, making four goals in succession before the bell, the first period ending with the score four to one in favor of Campbellton.

On the opening of the second period, Campbellton got away with some pretty combination work, scoring the first two goals of the period, making the count 6 to 1 in favor of Campbellton. This was the last for Campbellton, who never managed to get by Moar, the big Bathurst goaler, after that.
