COOKING CRANBERRIES. Take two quarts of cranberries, wash and put in one pint of water, and let boil till soft. Stir in a pinch of soda. Skim off blood. Sugar to sweeten. Cook like jelly, pour in a glass mold, and let get cold. It is like preserves.

PLUM MARMALADE. Wash a basket of red California plums and cut them into small pieces without removing the skins. Put the fruit into a porcelain or granite kettle, and let it boil ten minutes. At the end of that time add four pounds of granulated sugar and one pound of chopped raisins and boil twenty minutes longer. Add the rind of one and the juice of two oranges. Boil five minutes additional. Pour into jelly glasses or small jars and when cool seal.

DELIGHTFUL BUTTER. Cook down until juice is almost gone one can of unsweetened cherries. Add sugar and cook until of the consistency of jam. This is excellent and always fresh because made when ready to use.

TUTTI FRUTTI. One cupful of pineapple cut in small pieces, one cupful of currants, one cupful of raspberries, one cupful of blackberries, six peaches, cut up in small pieces, one-half pound of figs, cut up, one lemon, one orange and rind of both, one-fourth pound of blanched almonds, three and one-half cupfuls sugar and a half cupful of boiling water. Boil from twenty minutes to one-half hour. Fine with cold meats.

INK SPOTS. To remove ink spots from table linen and white goods place the stained article over a steaming kettle of water, at the same time squeezing the juice of a lemon on the spot. It will instantly remove the stain, but be sure the water is steaming. This has been tried successfully upon one colored garment without injuring the color.

SHOULDER HELP. I have found that some women do not know the laundressman's trick of ironing the shoulders of a shirtwaist over the small end of the ironing board, hanging the waist on with end of board projecting into the iron.

TO IRON NAPKINS. Wring every third napkin out of hot water; lay flat, one wet, two dry, one wet, etc., until all are used. Roll tightly and in a short time they are ready to be ironed. Always iron along with the hem, first on the right, then the wrong side, lastly on the right side again, folding as desired. Your linen will be perfectly dry and have a beautiful gloss.

WASHING BLANKETS. Cut out one of good sized into small pieces and boil in two quarts of water
