Statement by Ex-Ald. FINDLA

For the information of those citizens who have been lately annexed to the city, and others who may not be familiar with my record as an alderman, I give hereunder a list of some of the measures introduced by me, the fruits of which are being enjoyed by the ratepayers to-day:

- 1. I instituted and carried out the first real effort to lay and maintain good roads in this city. The citizens having endersed my proposition by voting \$100,000 for this purpose
- 2. I introduced and carried the by-law for the abolition of wooden sidewalks and wooden curbs, and the substitution therefore of permanent cement walks throughout the city, to be laid by day labor.
- I made the first effort to re-organize the City Engineer's Department, which has since been done, and I am glad to say under the present staff the work done is of a higher quality than ever before.
- I instituted day labor for all public works, with the result that this system has since been adhered to and to-day Hamilton gets this work done at a less cost than any Canadian municipality.
- 5. My denunciation of methods in the City Hospital caused a transformation in that institution. Within a few months thereafter nearly every official had been superceded by others and to-day it stands as it should—a credit to the city. I personally think that my action in this respect overshadows everything else I have ever done. shall never forget having to fight this battle single handed against nurses, officials and their friends, but

- 6. After three years of continuous agitation and opposition, my motion carried to transform the unsightly and unhealthy cab stand to the present beauty spot in the Gore extension. Who would dare take it away now?

- I believe I am broad minded enough to consider the best interests of all classes of citizens.
 - I have never shirked a vote in the Council
- I ask you to vote for me because I honestly believe I can be of good service to my fellow citizens, and I shall be grateful for the honor.


