Unintentional Profiteering

A WHEELWRIGHT in Essex, having executed a small job for some troops encamped near his workshop, sent to the authorities his account, which amounted to the modest sum of nine shillings and fivepence. To his amazement, he received in payment a check for ninety-five pounds.

Being the possessor of a conscience, the wheelwright wrote pointing out that his account was for nine shillings and fivepence only, and asking what he should do with the check sent to him. In reply, he received another check for ninety-five pounds. Not knowing what to do, he consulted a solicitor, who advised him to bank the money and let the authorities apply for its return.

When that story was told to the manager of a Surrey dairy he related a similar experience. Last summer the military authorities commandeered the entire stock of hay on a farm, and paid for it. They required only a portion of the stock to be delivered at once, however, and gave instructions for the remainder to be retained until further orders.

As the farmer heard nothing more, he wrote to the military authorities, and an officer came down, inspected the hay, and explained where it was to be sent. Some time afterwards the farmer received a check for one hundred and seventy pounds. He sent the check back, with the remainder that the hay had been paid for once; but it was returned to him, and it has since been paid into the bank.

Death of Edith Cavell was Instantaneous

Brussels, May 13.—The removal of the remains of Nurse Edith Cavell for interment in England takes place on Tuesday, May 13. The body was exhumed at Brussels on March 17, placed in a gable coffin of zinc and oak and conveyed to the Tir National. The body was found clothed in a black dress under a blue cloak. A black hat was also discovered in the coffin. The body was well preserved and the features were perfectly recognizable.

After funeral services to be conducted in the station hall by Rev. H. Cahan, the British chaplain, who was with Nurse Cavell the night before her execution, the coffin will be placed aboard a British warship for Dover where the Admiralty will hand it over to a committee charged with organizing the funeral in England.

It is understood the exhumation reveals that the nurse's death was instantaneous. She was struck by four bullets, two of which entered the right side, and two the left, one of the latter piercing her heart.

No Immigration For Canada

Until Fall, Except Farm Help, Domestic—Immigration of any kind from Overseas will not be encouraged until the Fall of 1920.

London, May 11.—With the exception of farm laborers and domestic servants no immigration will be accepted by the Canadian Immigration Commission here until the Autumn, and immigration of any kind will not be encouraged before next spring. Col. J. Obed Smith, Canadian Immigration Commissioner, stated that at present the department is only lecturing on Canada in the English schools. No immigration campaign will be carried on until the autumn in view of possible Canadian unemployment following demobilization and, consequently, it is expected, there will be a rush of new citizens until 1920.

There is apparently no trouble in securing domestic servants to help solve the service problem in Canada in connection with the breaking up of the "Waacs" and other women's war organizations, but as they wished to come over in bodies, steamship space for them could not be spared at present.

Regarding the exclusion of Germans, Col. Smith said German wives of Canadian soldiers would be allowed to go to Canada, but no Germans would be given passports under any other conditions. Russians are also excluded, while the department has cabled to Ottawa to ascertain whether they shall permit the passage of a Polish preacher wishing to go to Canada in connection with a Zionist movement.

Will Be On Staff

Major A. D. M. (Nick) Carter, Bathurst, one of the original officers of the Fighting 25th, and more lately of the Royal Air Force, is reported to be on the staff of the aerial squadron which is being recruited by Col. Raymond Collishaw for service in Russia.

Sir Robert Coming Home

Pacific, May 11.—Robert Borden, the Canadian Premier, is returning to Canada, according to Reuters London, because the political situation there is still uncertain. It is expected that Sir Robert will visit Sir Robert's place as head of the Canadian delegation.
