CANADIAN NEWS IN BRIEF

(By C.P.R. Telegraph)
Ottawa, Ont.—The Soldiers' Settlement Board announces that action is being taken to dispose of 75,000 acres of Hudson's Bay reserve land in Saskatchewan and Alberta, which have been cancelled by the Crown, also 10,400 acres of Doukhobor reserve lands near Kamack, Saskatchewan. Another 30,000 acres of grazing land will also be opened up. The whole 115,000 acres will be available for soldier settlement after April 30th.

Ottawa, Ont.—A return brought down in Parliament places the total enlistments in Canada for the Canadian Expeditionary Force at 590,572. By provinces the number was as follows: Ontario, 243,677; Quebec, 82,793; New Brunswick, 25,864; Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island, 33,242; Manitoba, 65,319; Saskatchewan, 37,666; Alberta, 45,146; British Columbia, 51,438; Yukon, 2,327.

Ottawa, Ont.—The applications of over 100 Imperial veterans who desire to take advantage of the Soldier Land Settlement scheme, have been approved. These veterans will be required to spend at least one year on farms in Canada to become familiar with Canadian methods. The others will be absorbed into the Board's training establishments and will be required to spend at least two years farming in Canada before becoming eligible for the loan benefits of the Act.

Quebec, P.Q.—During the last 15 years the Province of Quebec has spent \$22,000,000 on highways. In 1920 the ordinary annual provincial grants for education are \$2,000,000. The capital invested in pulp and paper plants within the province is \$84,000,000 and the number of mill employees about 10,000.

Sherbrooke, P.Q.—The Campbell-Howard Machine Company, formerly the Sherbrooke Iron Works Ltd., have sold their business to G. L. Bourne and F. A. Schaff, of New York. These gentlemen are respectively president and vice-president of the Locomotive Super-heater Co. of New York, railway supply people, and it is the intention to manufacture railway supplies for Canada, also to carry on a general foundry and machine business.

Vancouver, B.C.—According to announcement made by R. J. Lydell, vice-president of the Trans-Canada Theatres, Ltd., this company will shortly start the construction of a new theatre to be erected, close to the C. P. R. Vancouver Hotel, which will have a seating capacity of about 2,000 and cost \$400,000; construction of which will start shortly.

Commerce Board To Drop Control Over Newsprint

The Board of Commerce announced Wednesday that it will not henceforth claim or exercise any control whatever over newsprint paper in Canada. The announcement follows the decision of the Supreme Court in the Price Brothers case that newsprint paper was not a necessity of life within the meaning of that expression as used in the Combines and Fair Prices Act and that the powers exercised by the Board of Commerce as newsprint controller were without jurisdiction and inoperative in law.

The Board points out that the effect of the Supreme Court's decision is to render inoperative the orders-in-council consisting of the Board of Commerce controller of newsprint paper in Canada and for this reason the Board announces its intention of abandoning the control of newsprint, unless the Board is subsequently invested, if that be legally possible, with competently granted power.

The Board's announcement adds that the Supreme Court's decision does not involve the general powers of the Board of Commerce except insofar as it, to some extent, limits the interpretation which the Board might place upon the expression "necessity of life."

The general powers it is added will be pronounced upon by a subsequent decision of the court.

This decision will follow a rehearing in the Supreme Court on May 4 next of certain points in the recent argument heard in the court to test the powers of the Board of Commerce as a price fixing tribunal.

Canada's Population Now Nine Million

Canada's population is estimated for 1920 at nine million people; her total revenue per head 1920, \$75.01, and consolidated fund expenditure per head for 1920, \$30.0.

These figures were brought down in a return, tabled in the House at the request of Hon. W. S. Fielding, former Liberal Minister of Finance. Mr. Fielding asked for details as to revenue, expenditure and population for the years 1891 to 1920 inclusive.

The return showed that in 1891 Canada's total revenue was \$38,579,310.88. By 1919 that revenue had grown to \$312,946,747.13, and the estimated total revenue for 1920 is \$325,000,000.

Lounsbury Co., Ltd., Continue To Extend Premises

The Lounsbury Co., Ltd., with head office at Newcastle, have about completed a new five story building on Main Street, Moncton, and in order to make room for the fast increasing trade, have purchased the Peters property on Alma Street, which connects at the rear with their present property. This makes an addition of 85x112 feet.

At Campbellton this company have increased their show room space by adding to it the second floor of the building, which has heretofore been used as offices. This will make an addition of probably 25% in the show room floor.

At Bathurst the show room space has been more than doubled, while at Newcastle the second floor of the three story brick building, formerly occupied as offices, has been turned into a show room for carpets and furniture. These additions have been found necessary in order to take care of the fast increasing trade.

As soon as the painters are through with the building at Moncton and the store can be arranged, a formal opening will be advertised and all will be invited to inspect the new show rooms.

SENTENCES FOR STRIKE LEADERS

William Ivens, W. A. Pritchard, R. J. Johns, John Queen and George Armstrong, strike leaders, were sentenced by Mr. Justice Metcalfe in the Assizes Court, Winnipeg, on Tuesday, to one year in jail on each of the six counts of seditious conspiracy and six months for the count of common nuisance on which they were convicted. Sentence to run concurrently. N. E. Bray, who was convicted on a count of common nuisance, was sentenced to six months in jail.

NEWCASTLE MAN SENTENCED
William Grant, the C. N. R. engineer who pleaded guilty to receiving liquor, he knew to be stolen from the C. N. R. while in shipment, was sentenced Tuesday afternoon by Police Magistrate Limerick to a six months' term of imprisonment in the York County Jail, the sentence to be made concurrent with that of the other prisoners to date from March 18th.
