GEORGE ROY TELLS OF EARLY DAYS OF W.

Interesting Reminiscences of an Old Timer, Who Has Been Resident in Edmonton 22 Years—Has Seen Frontiers Past Develop Into a Metropolitan City.

(From Monday's Bulletin.) Among the interesting reminiscences of the old timers of the west, none are fuller of human interest than those of George Roy, resident in the Edmonton District for the past 22 years.

From the time he left Detroit in 1878 and set his feet westward, he aimed to cast in his lot with the pioneer in the sparsely settled west to the present time when he finds himself in the midst of the comingness and commercial metropolis of western Canada, he has seen many changes and has had many experiences that fall of interest.

Towards the Setting Sun. Mr. Roy left his home in Detroit, June 1878, bound for the west to seek his fortune. He was a young man of hope in the mysterious future stretched alluringly before him.

Not long after his arrival in Edmonton, he was appointed as first registrar of the new form of government which was then in its infancy.

The first registry office in Edmonton was in the building now known as the Hotel. It was situated in the block between the present site of the C.P.R. and the present site of the C.N.R.
