Cable News.

LONDON, To-day.

Lord Milner conveys, through the press a solemn appeal to the people of Britain against Irish Home Rule. It manifests and breathes resistance to the measure if it is legislated upon without the endorsement of a general election and also contains a declaration in favor of supporting any action necessary to prevent putting the measure into operation. Other signatories include Field Marshal Roberts, Admiral Fleet, Seymour, Ryke, Portland, Viscount Halifax, Lord Lovatt, Sir Hester Chubb, Sir William Ramsay, Rudyard Kipling, and many other prominent names. It is intended to circulate copies through the country and compile a register of adherents. Answering Hope, Unionist member of Sheffield, Asquith stated to the Commons last night, he was most anxious to expedite the financial business of the Government, to enable him to make a statement on the Ireland Bill at an early day, at the same time the Prime Minister gave Bonar Law a promise of the second reading of the Bill which will soon be introduced for a third time to be proceeded with as soon as financial matters are disposed of; John Redmond, T. P. O'Connor, Jno. Dillon and Jos. Devlin had a long interview with the Prime Minister yesterday, the inference is that the Irish leaders met in conference on the Government's proposals with regard to Ulster.

LONDON, To-day.

The regimental strength of the regular army, exclusive of men serving on the staff was on October 1st, 247,250, the lowest figure. The previous year's strength was 253,762. In the complete establishment 8,550 of all ranks are needed as compared with 5,977 needed in 1912. Brigadier General Fittion, Director of recruiting points out 178,468 male Britons emigrated in 1913 and says while there are hopeful signs of the slackening appetite for Canada for emigrants of the unskilled laborer class and discouraging from the recruiting viewpoint note, Australia had inaugurated a scheme immigration for youths of every age in which the majority remained in the army.

St. David's Day Dinner.

Last night the Welsh people in the city attended a dinner at Wood's Restaurant. Besides the Welshborn residents who number about a score, there were several guests. This is the first occasion, as far as can be ascertained, that the Welsh people in Newfoundland, have gathered together to do honor to their patron Saint. The affair was a glorious success and those present unanimously expressed the hope that similar gatherings in honor of St. David's Day, will be held annually. Rev. Mr. Thomas performed the duties of Chairman with great eclat. Shortly after 8 p.m. the company sat down to an excellent repast following which a real Welsh Toast List was dealt with.

The King was proposed by the Chairman.

The toast of the evening "Dewi Sant" was proposed by Mr. G. B. Lloyd and responded to by Mr. E. J. Davies whose stirring speech appealed strongly to the patriotic feelings of his hearers.

The toast of "Hen wlad fy nhadau," the land of my fathers, was next proposed by Mr. W. Thomas. The company responding by singing the Welsh National Anthem.

The next toast was the "British Empire," proposed by Mr. I. R. Morgan, the company responding with "Rule Britannia."

Newfoundland (Tir Newydd) The land of our adoption, was proposed by Mr. R. E. Evans; Messrs P. H. Knowlton and W. Soper responding.

The song "Newfoundland" was here sung, Mrs. Thomas taking the solo part.

Mr. J. Williams proposed the ladies, and Mr. A. M. Jones responded.

To the toast of "Chairman" given by Mr. Lewis, Rev. Mr. Thomas replied.

Songs were given by the following: Mrs. Thomas, Mr. J. Williams, Rev. Thomas, Mr. Lewis, Mr. Davies and Mr. Lloyd. Mrs. Davies and Mr. Lloyd presided at the piano. Recitations were given by Mr. I. R. Morgan.

The affair terminated at 11.30 p.m. Those responsible are to be congratulated on their successful efforts.
