Prospero Back.

REPORTS MILD WINTER NORTH—HERRING FISHERY AN UNPRECEDENTED SUCCESS IN GREEN BAY—PARTICULARS OF FIRE AT TRINITY.

The S. S. Prospero, Capt. A. Keen, returned from Griquet and intervening northern ports yesterday afternoon. Going north a severe snow storm was encountered a week ago and the ship was forced to shelter at Baie Verte for a day and night. That was the only rough weather experienced on the trip. On the whole the winter north is mild, along the French Shore there being little slob ice met but nothing to impede the headway of the ship. She brought a full freight and a number of passengers.

During the last few days when the ship was coming south the weather was intensely cold, the thermometer being down below zero on Sunday last.

The herring fishery in Green Bay for last fall and this winter is the best in the history of the country," said our informant. Since the beginning of the year the fishes have been in abundance all over the Bay and of an unusually large size and daily the fishermen have their "hands full" attending to their nets. Most of the herring caught are being packed under the Scotch cure because from \$7 to \$10 per barrel is being paid by American and Canadian agents throughout Green Bay for herring cured by this process, whereas very much less is offered for herring

put up under the old system. The Prospero brought along 2,500 barrels of Scotch cured herrings which are now being landed at the Red Cross pier to be transhipped to outside markets by the S. S. Stophano. When the Prospero reached Trinity late Monday night, on her way south, particulars of a destructive fire, alluded to in yesterday's Telegram and which had occurred a few hours previously, were learned. About 9 o'clock the fire broke out in the Methodist Parsonage, occupied by the Rev. J. French and wife, who were in the dining room when they discovered through the crackling of wood and smelling of smoke that another room in the house was ablaze. The fire was caused by a defective stove pipe. Immediately an alarm was given by the occupants to neighbours who were on the scene and the fire was fought by a bucket brigade, but the efforts of the volunteer fire fighters were useless, owing to the fire being well under way. The flames were fanned by a strong wind that prevailed so that within a short time the Parsonage and its contents were a heap of ruins. The loss is great to the Pastor, as we understand, there was very little, if any insurance carried on the building, and general sympathy will be felt for him. Only a few articles of furniture were saved; besides \$200 in cash, which was in the house and which belonged to the Church, went up in smoke. A fortunate circumstance is that the fire was prevented from spreading, through the splendid exertions of the people, as several dwellings and the Presbytery of Rev. Fr. Tarahan was close by.


