A sixth child was so severely burned that its recovery is doubtful.

## Going Down.

Chicago Herald: Five submarines in a single day! That's a record which speaks volumes for the efficiency of the Allied precautions against this danger. As an isolated incident it would be vastly encouraging. But one would not be justified in drawing broad conclusions therefrom any more than from the failure of the campaign in one week to net more than one merchant victim exceeding 1,000 tons. The explicit declaration of Lloyd George in this connection that he regards the submarine menace as practically ended, however, gives this report for a single day a much larger significance. He is acquainted with all the devices, old and new, now being employed to counteract this danger. He knows to what extent they are directly responsible for this fortunate showing. He can estimate the extent to which merely fortuitous circumstances entered into this particular result. His statement, therefore, affords solid ground for the belief that the fight against the submarines has entered a new and altogether more satisfactory phase.

## LINES OF EMOTION.

The needless burning out of vitality naturally wears off tissues and soon firm flesh becomes flabby and a young face assumes the aspect of age. To merely lament these failing charms and accept the inevitable, is the course hundreds of women pursue until brought to a realization of their folly.

Then, in their dismay and serious alarm, they expect miracles to happen with a few massage treatments after years of neglect and indifference. It is far wiser to erase lines just forming, or slight furrows, than deep set ones, especially after the first blush of youth is only a memory. The thin woman will find that her flesh is more inclined to wrinkles than that of a plump, or an admittedly fleshy one, because the flesh of the former is firmer.

When the pulse is sufficiently elastic, two treatments a week for a month or six weeks make an excellent foundation for a good smooth skin and, with the assistance of expert advice, a woman may continue the treatments in her own boudoir.

As a preliminary to the massage movements, before they are begun, the skin should be especially prepared for the work. The face is thoroughly cleansed with warm water and a good soap, one that agrees with the skin. Rinse thoroughly in tepid water and dry. Then, for a moment or two go over the face with the tips of the fingers in massage movements to get the circulation moving. A cleansing cream may be substituted in place of the face bath if so desired. It should be carefully removed from the pores with a bit of absorbent cotton and the skin will be ready for the massage.
