Lieut.-Col. A. N. Strode-Jackson, who took a leading part in organizing the great international athletic contest at Queen's Club, is a famous runner, his greatest achievement being a brilliant success in the Olympic games at Stockholm in 1912, when he beat the American favorite in the 1,500 metre race by less than a yard. Col. Strode-Jackson won great distinction in the war, and holds the D.S.O. with three bars. He was also a prominent member of the British Mission at the Peace Conference in Paris. He is married to the step-daughter of Mr. Orton Tewson, a well known American Journalist. Col. Strode-Jackson is tall and thin, with an eagle eye.

The whole question, however, is intimately bound up with the arrangements under which His Majesty receives a certain part of his income. When the King came to the throne, he, as his predecessors had done, ceded his property to the state, in consideration of which his majesty receives a certain sum annually.

**Resolution of  
Condolence.**

**FROM CIVIC COMMISSION.**  
Arising out of the death of Mr. John L. Slattery, Secretary-Treasurer, a special meeting of the Municipal Council was held yesterday afternoon. The following resolution of condolence was introduced by Mayor Gosling who in sympathetic terms referred to the great loss the city had sustained through the demise of Mr. Slattery, who for so many years held the important office of Secretary-Treasurer of the Council. Commissioners Mulhally, Morris, Ayre, Vinnicombe, Peet and Devine spoke to the resolution and referred to the sterling character of the deceased, both as a citizen and civic official. The following was then placed on record:

**BE IT RESOLVED.**—The Municipal Council, in special session assembled, desires to place on record its deep sorrow on the death of the late Secretary-Treasurer of the Council, Mr. John L. Slattery. For over thirty years Mr. Slattery has been a trusted official of the Municipality, filling the important post of Secretary-Treasurer since 1898. During all that time he held the entire confidence and respect of each successive Council. His strength of character, devotion to duty, absolute honesty, knowledge of civic affairs and high sense of justice made him a most valuable official, to the Council and to the city. The interests of the city were ever uppermost in his mind, and its progress and improvement his most ardent wish. The Council desires to extend its sincere sympathy to his relatives in their great loss, and directs that a copy of this Resolution shall be sent to them.

**WEALTHY ENGLISHMAN NOW OWNS MILFORD HOUSE.**

Milford Haven, a town of considerable antiquity, in Pembrokeshire, in Wales, has just been purchased by Major Hugh J. P. Thomas, a well-known land owner for \$1,350,000. This big estate comprises 1,000 houses, a lordship of three manors, a fine castle, a mansion house and the market tolls of the town, in addition to the finest land-locked harbor in the world.

Commercially the port is in its infancy, but with the development of the plans and schemes contemplated, it may some day rival Liverpool and Southampton in the trade from the Americas.

The site of the town formed part of the possessions of Sir William Hamilton, who built the mansion of Castle Hall a hundred and twenty years ago; Castle Hall, as the home of the beautiful Emma Hamilton, was often visited by Lord Nelson.

The church near the haven was consecrated in 1803 and the font with the Hamilton arms was given by Lady Hamilton. In those days the mail coach from London brought the mails for Ireland to Milford. All this district is rich in history; there's a letter in existence, from the Earl of Pembroke to Queen, Elizabeth, dated February 11, 1592, about the necessity of fortifying Milford Haven.

Basin—the only place in the world where people literally walk on gold. For here, exposed on the sands, in quantities incalculable, is the greatest thing on earth, bar health and love. Here Mother Earth is spotted on the surface with that metal of yellow glint for which nations war. On the sands of this dreary, sun-parched desert-basin is the gleaming goal of Gain—gold, all gold, under foot, wherever you step, in a mountain-rimmed place six miles in circumference. Here, indeed, is the largest and most valuable low-grade gold "mine" known to geologists. But as the gold is right on the surface, why does not someone go there and pick it up? Because, first of all, the owner of that basin is the only person who has a right to pick it up; second, because, after one has picked up some ten tons or so of sand, he has picked up with it only about two pennyworth of gold. And to separate that two pennyworth of gold from the ten tons of sand costs more than twopence. Any thief is welcome to all the gold he can steal in that El Dorado. After such a robber has picked up ten tons of sand, having brought ten carts for the purpose, he would have to haul the loads a distance of sixty miles to the nearest ore-mill in order to get the gold. Meantime, any of his ten mules hitched to his ten carts would have eaten, in a single meal, more than twopence worth of hay or oats. Still the gold is there, dotting the surface with millions of glistening specks, all as plain to the eye as the millions of dancing points of sunlight on the surface of the sea on a calm day.—Tit-Bits.
