Real Tarzan of the Apes.

The fantastic stories of Rudyard Kipling's Mowgli and of Tarzan of the Apes have found a parallel in real life in the case of a North India hill baby stolen and reared by a leopard. Stuart Baker, when in the village of Lungi, in the Cachar Hills, on India's northeastern frontier, was confronted in the local court house with protests from a certain native that he was unable to do his share of local road mending, because if he left home his little wild son would run away to the jungle. The father's story is that when the boy was two years old a female leopard had come upon the child and mother in a rice field, snatching the baby from the mother and bounding away into the jungle. A search was instituted but no trace of the child could be found. Three years later sportsmen tracked a leopard to her lair and killed her. There they captured two cubs and the child, who had apparently been reared with the leopard's litter. The parents identified the child and their claim was admitted by the whole village. When first caught the child bit and fought with every one who came near him and roared any village fowls that he could capture, devouring them savagely. He ran about on all fours with extraordinary rapidity, and his knees had hard callouses on them, while his toes remained upright, almost at right angles to the instep. Later he learned to eat cooked food, consented to sleep in his father's hut, and seemed to know the villagers by sense of smell.

Romance of Shorthand.

Writing by signs goes back to 155 B.C. But for many centuries shorthand seems to have vanished from the world. In fact, it was not until the eighteenth century that shorthand in this country, at any rate, began to come into its own. This was due to the fact that the Morning Chronicle organized a regular staff of reporters, and an effective system of shorthand being demanded, various systems were invented. One known as Mason's attracted the attention of Thomas Gurney, to whom credit is due for the official recognition of shorthand. Gurney started life as a clockmaker, but the real interest of his life lay in shorthand. While still a youth he purchased at a sale a book which contained a copy of William Mason's "Shorthand." He mastered the system, and at the age of sixteen he began to take down sermons. Ultimately he was appointed shorthand writer to the Old Bailey, thus achieving the distinction of being the first official shorthand writer appointed in this country. In 1750 he was appointed shorthand writer to the Government, a post still held by members of the same family, though the system was little used nowadays. It is interesting to note that Thomas Gurney's son, Joseph Gurney, was called upon by the House of Commons in 1789 to read, from his notes of the trial of Warren Hastings, Burke's words accusing Sir Elijah Impey of murder. Punish Parents for Daughter's Fault

The consistory of the Passaic (New Jersey) Netherlands Church has expelled the parents of Miss Hagberg from the church, in consequence of the girl's elopement with the Rev. Cornelius Densel, pastor of the church. The consistory holds that parents should be responsible for a daughter's moral conduct, and that if daughters become vampires, it is the parents' fault. The consistory has taken no action against Densel for the girl. The formal expulsion of Mr. and Mrs. Hagberg took place at the conclusion of a church service. The presiding elder rose and made the announcement, which met with the congregation's approval. The spread discussion has been caused by this effort to fix the responsibility for the behavior of modern children on the parents. The main question is whether modern parents exercise control of the development of their children's character, either by being too much individualism or merely carelessness. Many parents, it is agreed, want all their time to themselves and refuse the self-discipline which the disciplining of the children entails.
