Jackson Won The Truro Road Race in Easy Fashion.

RAN UNDER THE WORST POSSIBLE
CONDITIONS.

The annual road race for the Dun-
lop Tire & Rubber Company trophy,
was held last Wednesday at Truro,
N.S., under the auspices of the local
Y. M. C. A. The road and weather
conditions were the worst possible,
the mud being ankle deep, and a
blinding snowstorm beat down on the
runners during the five mile grind.
Only two teams were entered, the
Crescents of Halifax, and a Y.M.C.A.
team from the same place. The for-
mer beat out their opponents by six
points, the final standing reading 16
to 22. Laurie Jackson of the Cres-
cents, finished in first place with Han-
son of the Y. M. C. A. team in sec-
ond place. The remarkable time of
28 minutes shows that Jackson can
run exceptionally well under difficult
conditions, and well deserved the sil-
ver cup offered for the first man to
cross the final line. Hanson received
a gold medal for second prize.
It would be well that our sporting
public act wisely in procuring their
tickets as quickly as possible, as the
meet between Bell and Jackson, this
night week, over a course of ten miles
in the Princes Rink, gives every prom-
ise of being a "hum dinger." Jackson
and his trainer are leaving Halifax

Early Morning Fire.

HOUSE ON CASEY STREET GUTTED
OUT.

The Central and West End Fire
Companies were called out to an
alarm of fire on Casey Street at 3 o-
clock this morning, where the fire-
fighters found a very serious blaze in
progress at the residence of Mr. Mos-
es Kealey. The premises, formerly a

store, had been converted into a
dwelling house, having been purchased
by Mr. Kealey some months ago, who
was living in the house alone at the
time. The cause of the blaze was due
to the overheating of a stove pipe,
which soon ignited the ceiling, and
when the firemen arrived it was dif-
ficult for them to get at the seat of
the flames, and for a time conditions
looked very serious. Two good
streams of water were soon playing

on the building, but all danger had
not passed for upwards of an hour,
the firemen being greatly handicapped
in their work owing to the flames
spreading between the adjoining walls
of the residence, occupied by two fam-
ilies named Cullen and Carrigan. The
"all-out" sounded an hour and a half
later. Mr. Kealey, whose residence
was badly gutted, had the house and
contents covered by insurance in the
sum of \$900; but no insurance was

carried by the occupants of the
adjoining house, which suffered
from fire and water.
