## Lloyd George is Denounced by the Morning Post.

Another Earthquake Shakes Japan—Halifax County Elects Black by Big Majority—200 Results of British Elections To-night.

**200 DECLARATIONS TO-DAY.**  
LONDON, Dec. 5. Of the two hundred declarations which will be all the election results announced Thursday night, the most interesting of all will be Winston Churchill's fate. Premier Baldwin, Lloyd George and Ramsay MacDonald will be uncertain of their success till Friday as no announcement as to how they fared will be made until the day following the election.

**LOYD GEORGE'S APPEAL TO LONDON.**  
LONDON, Dec. 5. Lloyd George followed up his appeal to the electors of London at Camberwell to-day by a letter to the Liberal Evening Star saying: "London, the greatest city in the world, is in danger. She lives by trade as no other city in the world lives by it and trade if it is to grow must be free. London does one-third of the overseas trade of Great Britain and receives more than one-third of her imports on the basis of this great trade itself a gift of free trade. London has become the financial centre of the whole world and the source of the development of our mighty Empire. To limit these activities by tariff would deal a deadly blow to the work and wages of the citizens of London."

**MORNING POST ROUGH ON LLOYD GEORGE.**  
LONDON, Dec. 5. The Morning Post, the only London Journal which has been behind Premier Baldwin to the utmost in this election, is just as extreme against his prominent opponents. In an editorial depicting Lloyd George as the arch villain in the political crisis the Post says, during his term of office there was no British interest in

the Allies' regime. There is no idea of evacuating the Ruhr at present and French troops will maintain their existing strength but will be taken off the streets. The principal measure of relief for the occupied district will be the release of many political prisoners and permission to expelled persons to return home.

**ASQUITH NOT ACCEPTING A PEERAGE.**  
LONDON, Dec. 5. Mr. Asquith was asked last night if he intended accepting a peerage, thus causing a bye-election in a few months in Paisley if he is re-elected to-morrow. He replied "I have no intention of doing any such thing."

**BLACK ELECTED.**  
HALIFAX, Dec. 5. W. E. A. Black, Conservative, head of the steamship firm of Pickford and Black, was elected here to-day to represent Halifax city and county in the Federal Parliament in the vacancy created by the appointment of Hon. A. K. Maclean to the Presidency of the Exchequer Court of Canada. George A. Redmond, Liberal, his only opponent in the bye-election, was defeated by a majority of about sixteen hundred votes. This is the first break in the solid Liberal representation sent to Ottawa at the general elections in 1921.

**FRENCH EASING UP ON THE RUHR.**  
PARIS, Dec. 5. Troops occupying the Ruhr are gradually to be concentrated in camps outside the city, it was explained by French Government officials to-day. The design is to make the occupation less burdensome and irritating to the Germans in reward for their apparent disposition to abandon hostilities to ward occupation and co-operate with

**JAPAN AGAIN SHAKEN BY EARTHQUAKE.**  
HONOLULU, Dec. 5. The whole central portion of Japan, including Kobe, Osaka and other cities, were shaken by earthquakes early to-day, according to a Tokio despatch. There was no loss of life or great property damage, but the panic-stricken people abandoned their homes, seeking safety in the open.

**TO BE TRIED FOR HIGH TREASON.**  
MUNICH, Dec. 5. The trial of Adolph Hitler, Fascist leader, and General Ludendorff, for the part taken by them in the recently attempted "putch" has been fixed for early in January. The men will be charged before a special tribunal for political offences on a charge of high treason.

**SIR WM. MACKENZIE DEAD.**  
TORONTO, Dec. 5. Sir William Mackenzie, leading Canadian financier and railroad builder, who has been ill at his residence here for some time, died at 12.30 this afternoon. Sir William was taken ill some time ago and a few weeks ago pneumonia was feared by the attending physicians. This was ward off and the patient was reported to be on the road to recovery. He was 74 years old. Lady Mackenzie pre-deceased him some years ago. Burial will take place on Friday at Kirkfield, Ont.

**GILLETT RE-ELECTED.**  
WASHINGTON, Dec. 6. F. W. Gillett, of Massachusetts, was re-elected Speaker of the House to-day when the Republican insurgents voted for him for the first time since the deadlock developed on Monday.

**FLOODS IN ITALY.**  
DOMODOSSOLA, Italy, Dec. 6. A torrent, swollen by the rising Osola River, is threatening the safety of the Simplicon railway line and many inhabitants of the region have fled from their homes, fearing disaster.

**FOSTER DEFENDS LEAGUE.**  
TORONTO, Dec. 5. "Only mental obtuseness and an appalling lack of information could permit anyone to think that the League of Nations is a mere pipe-dream," declared Sir George E. Foster, in addressing the Women's Canadian Club yesterday.

**105 MILES AN HOUR.**  
ERIE, Pa., Dec. 5. What was believed to be a new world's speed record for an electrically propelled railway locomotive was established here yesterday in the plant of the General Electric Company, before a gathering of foremost railroad officials and engineers in the United States. The locomotive attained a speed of 105 miles an hour.

**WAS HE!**  
NEW YORK, Dec. 6. Charles G. Annis, of Necumteuch, N.S., who was ruled off the tracks in 1912 for withdrawing an entry without official consent, was reinstated by the Board of Review of the National Trotting Association at its meeting here to-day.

**BOTH SIDES ACCEPT REPORT.**  
OTTAWA, Dec. 6. Officials of the International Longshoremen's Association, St. John, N. B., and representatives of the Shipping Federation have notified the Department of Labor that they are prepared to accept the report of the Board of Conciliation which dealt with the demands of the men for higher wages and improved working conditions.

**SEVEN KILLED IN CLASH WITH POLICE.**  
BERLIN, Dec. 6. Seven persons were killed and thirty wounded in a clash to-day between unemployed and police at Wanne Westphalia. The former, discontented over the amount paid them as unemployed doles, tried to storm the Town Hall. They attacked the police with stones and bullets, and the police used firearms. French troops restored order.
