I recognize that there are other respiratory affections from which bleedmay occur. For example, nasal and sinus conditions may cause bleeding, but it is usually a great mistake to allow the patient believe that bleeding comes "from the threat." In the many such cases that I have seen, only twice have I found the bleeding to come "from the throat." The amount of blood brought up, however, is small in such cases and a careful examination of the upper respiratory tract will usually discover or rule out these conditions. Then, of course, we have cardiac and chronic lung conditions, such as bronchiectasis, abcess, etc., from which bleeding may occur. A careful history and examination and a negative sputum usually determine the diagnosis among these patients. In those cases in which there has been a history of an hemo ptysis and in which rales cannot be found in the upper third of the lungs,

usually dealing with some condition other than tuberculosis. And here wish to emphasize the need of placing patient down to rest treatment at once when you think that any blood has come from the lungs. An hemoptysis indicates pathologic activity and as such should be promptly treated on general rest lines. The negect of this is inexcusable and has been in the sputum. the cause of allowing many a patient to drift into incurable tuberculosis. If there is the slightest doubt as to the origin of the bleeding, make it a point

diagnosis may be established. Pleurisy with effusion is a most deendable symptom. In our series of 1200 cases, 78 gave a history of pleurisy with effusion and in 78 p.c. of these a definite parenchymatous Xray lesion was found in the lungsthat is to say, a demonstrable intrapulmonary tuberculosis lesion, It may be generally accepted that serofibrinous pleurisy coming on insidiously and with few symptoms, is almost certain to be tuberculosis in origin. Neglect to realize this fact is dangerous and many a pleurisy patient, had he been warned at the right time and given appropriate care, might have been saved prolonged and costly institutional treatment. especially for them. The third lesson we have learned is regarding laboratory findings. We see the need of greater care in the microscopic examination of sputum. By cases, not only the examination of specimens taken on several consecutive days, but the spending of a much longer time in the study of each smear, sometimes 15 minutes or more (Bring up these points: any patient who gives a history of bringing up sputum from the lungs, make it an invariable habit to ask for a specimen for microscopic examination. To sum up a few lessons we have learned in the diagnosis of tuberculosis. Before a patient can be pronounced tuberculosis he must have one or more of the following findings: (1) The presence of tubercle bacilli

(2) A parenchymatous X-ray lesion in the upper third of the chest,

i.e., above 3R and 4 v.s. (3) Fine or m.c. rales in the same (4) A history of hemoptysis.

(5) A history of pleurisy with ef fusion. Suspected Tuberculosis.

(1) Absence of tubercle bacilli. (2) Doubtful or negative physical or X-ray findings in the upper

third of the chest. (3) History of either an hemo ptysis or pleurisy with effusion. Not Tuberculosis.
