The Dunkin Act.

We understand that at a Temperanco conference, held on Thursday evening it was resolved to endeaver to secure the Act for the Town of Guelph.

The following is a copy of the petition being circulated for signatures and to which a considerable number of ratepayers' names have been already tached:—

"The undersigned qualified municipal electors of the Town of Guelph hereby require that a poll be taken in terms of the Temperance Act of 1864 to determine whether or not the qualified municipal electors of the said municipality will adopt under authority and for enforcement of the said Act the By-law following, which we hereby propose for their adoption, to wit:—

"The sale of intoxicating liquors and the issue of licenses therefor, is by the present By-law prohibited within the Town of Guelph, under authority, and for enforcement of the Temperance Act of 1864."
