The New Town Hall. A good part of the time occupied by the Council on Monday night was taken up in discussing the report of the Market House Committee, recommending that tenders for the erection of a new Town Hall, on the ate of the present vegetable market shed, be accepted. The report was adopted by a considerable majority. adopted by a considerable majority and it is now left to the ratepayers to say whether they will sanction the action of the Council, and pass the By-law for the issue of debentures to defray the expense of building.

Everyone admits the necessity that exists for a new Town Hall. The only question is, where is the best only question is, where is the best location? For our own part we considered that the extension of the present building was the best and most economical plan which could be devised, and we have yet to be convinced that a wing added to the west side would mar the architectural proportions of the present building. By adding this the same accommodation would be provided for market stalls as by the ercettion of a market stalls as by the erection of a new building, the cost would be over \$4,000 less, and the whole structure would be compact, convenient, and would give to us a hall unequalled in the Province. The Council how-ever have decided in favor of a new and separate building, which is proposed to be built on the site of the present vegetable shed, and which will have access to it all round the lower story for market purposes. Above will be the Hall, with the necessary retiring rooms, and in rear a large supper room.

The greatest objection to this site, as also to the extension of the present building, is their proximity to the railway. Public meetings and other gatherings are liable to be annoyed by the noise of trains and the screaming of locomotive whistles. Horses brought to market are also more liable to be frightened from their nearness to the trains. To obviate this some propose that the new hall should be located farther up town, but the objection to this plan is that the lower storey in that case could not be utilized for market purposes, as it would be inadvisable to divide the market. The Council—or at least the majority—hold that more market accommodation is urgently required, but they will not consent to put up any building but to not town property, and as close as possible to the present Market House, so as to have all branches of the market as near each other as practicable.

The scheme is now before the ratepayers for their consideration, and to them we refer it, promising to return to the subject at an early day.
