MOTHERS' CLUB ASKS FOR CURFEW LAW IN CITY

Would Have Liquor Catalogs Barred From Mails; Not Ready to Enter Politics

Many women of the city are anxious for a curfew law and yesterday another organization, the Mothers' Club of the Normal school, decided to ask the city council for such legislation. Other organizations have already petitioned the council in this regard, but have so far secured nothing definite. The use of the mails by the liquor dealers in the country was also debated by the meeting and the Local Council of Women will be asked to take the matter up. The waste of postage, paper and time resulting from the distribution of their literature among householders who are not the least interested in their goods was a point brought up, while another member drew attention to the fact that the way dealers have changed the style of envelopes and wrappers so that the post office officials at a casual glance do not distinguish them from circulars containing insurance notice, water and light bills, etc. Many considered the literature as objectionable and would have the government prohibit the use of the mails for the purpose.

Work of Society
On the definite request of the admiralty authorities, the society is about to erect additional naval rests at various naval bases, for the welfare and comfort of sailors when on shore. The society has also been urged to extend similar provision for merchant seamen in many ports.

I have seen evidence of the splendid relief work of this society in providing clothes and food for sailors interned in Germany; dispensing immediate practical assistance to disabled sailors and dependents of seamen who have fallen on war service; in providing an education for sailors' orphans; and especially in feeding, sheltering, clothing and forwarding to their various homes many thousands of merchant seamen whose vessels have been sunk by enemy action.

Surely there is no one who would willingly turn a deaf ear to the claims of these brave men and women, to whom the whole nation owes so profound a debt of gratitude? For their sake I sincerely hope that I may rely on the co-operation of your readers in a really generous response to the centenary appeal of the British and Foreign Sailors' society.
