

Would Have Liquor Catalogs Barred From Mails; Not Ready to Enter **Politics**

Many women of the city are anxious for a curfew law and yesterday another organization, the Mothers' club of the Normal school, decided to ask the city council for some such legislation. The waste of the distribution of their literature among nouseholders who are not the least interested in their goods was a point brought in while another member drew attention to the fact that the way dealers have changed the style of envelopes and wrap-pers so that the post office officials at a asual glance do not distinguish them rom circulars containing insurance no-ce, water and light bills, etc. Many onsidered the literature as objectionab and would have the government prohibit the use of the mails for the purpose. 
